That's how simple it is. Or if you have lots of calls for cool drinks, then just dissolve a whole package of fruit-flavored gelatin, in a cup of hot water, then add a cup of cold water. That makes enough syrup for 6 to 8 drinks. And what flavors! Strawberry, raspberry, cherry, orange, lemon and lime—all at your fingertips, easily stored on the kitchen shelf.

Here's a raspberry gelatin combination with crushed bananas and milk. Easy enough for an eight-year-old to make for herself and friends. Refreshing enough for "Mama" to want some, too.

RASPBERRY-BANANA MILKSHAKE

- 1 tablespoon raspberry flavored gelatin
- 2 tablespoons VERY HOT water
- 1 to 2 tablespoons mashed

banana (VERY RIPE)
1 cup milk.
Dissolve gelatin in VERY HOT water, in a tall glass. Add mashed banana, mix to blend. Add milk, stirring to blend. Makes 1 serving.

Cherry-flavored gelatin syrup
Chocolate ice cream
Milk.

Lime-flavored gelatin syrup
Crushed peaches
Milk

Just plain lemon or lime flavored syrup in carbonated water with or without ice cream.
