

Yankees make Clean Sweep in Olympic Tennis, Swimming Competition

Yankees Break Records in Four Aquatic Events

Helen Wills, Vincent Richards, Add Two Net Titles to Three Already Held by Cohorts.

By BASIL D. WOON. PARIS, July 20.—The Stars and Stripes ruled Paris today when American athletes, showing off for the large Sunday crowds, won every event on the Olympic program.

Two more tennis titles went to a son and daughter of Uncle Sam, who "broke the racket" when Helen Wills crushed Miss Vlasto, of France, in the championship match, 6-2, 6-2, and Vincent Richards defeated Henri Cochet of France, 6-4, 6-4, 5-7, 4-6, 6-2.

At the end of the day the standing nations were America, 20, which is 10 points for each of the titles; France, 20; England, 13; Italy, 3.

But more remarkable was the showing of the American swimmers in the final events today. Six were won by the American men and women. There were only six events on the program.

In addition to sweeping the pool, the swimmers established two world records and one Olympic record in the four events in which records are possible. The other events were plain high diving for women and fancy high diving for men which not only went to Uncle Sam but saw five of his entries in the first six places.

The first world record fell when the American 300-meter relay team, composed of Weismuller, Bryer, O'Connor and Clancy, finished far ahead of the closest competitor, in 9 minutes, 52 2/5 seconds.

Myrtle Bauer of Chicago turned in the other world record in winning the 100-meter back stroke in 1 minute, 23 2/5 seconds.

His record was set by Johnny Weismuller, who won the 100-meter free style in 59 seconds flat.

Miss Ethel Lackie of the Illinois A. C., won the 100-meter free style for women in 1 minute, 12 2/5 seconds. It was the only American performance that was not a record.

Wins Diving Contest. Caroline Smith of Cairo, Ill., won the women's high diving contest with Elizabeth Becker of Atlantic City second, and Helen Meaney of New York fourth, behind Miss Topel of Sweden.

Albert White, Dave Fall and Clarence Pinkato, all Americans, finished one-two-three in the men's high diving contest.

When the ripples had stilled on the Olympic pool, America was far out in the lead in aquatic competition.

More than all the other nations of the world had been able to score by one. Sweden was second with 58, England third with 50, Australia fourth with 35, France fifth with 17, and Belgium sixth with 13.

HE Omaha Buffaloes put in a rather satisfactory afternoon yesterday at Fifteenth and Vin-ton streets. They romped away with a brace of games from Howard Gregory and his Wichita Witches, shutting the visitors out in two clean double shutouts.

Those two victories, which were in the first and 4 to 0 in the second, thereby breaking their clean record in the four-game series.

The games Sunday were the last that will be played on the home lot for two weeks, as the Buffaloes leave this afternoon on a swing around the southern arm of the circuit. The Buffaloes played 18 games on their own diamond since July 5, when they returned home from Des Moines, and during that time won 11 of the 18 contests, losing seven, which is a mighty good record for any club.

Those two victories, Harry Lee and Bill Bailey, both of the scrappy variety, had the honor yesterday of swinging the whitewash brush over the Witches. Lee pitching the first game and Bill the second. Both hurled as nice a game of baseball as one would care to cast one's glowing glimmers on. Harry allowed six hits, all singles, while Bailey was nipped for a scant three hits by a double.

The support the Buffaloes received was one of the features of the double-header, especially the out-fielding of Joe Bonowitz and the in-fielding of Jimmy O'Neil at shortstop. Both Joseph and James robbed Witches of singles by spectacular catches which more than pleased the 15-cent boys and girls.
