

# Harris Johnston Defeats Albert Seckel for Western Amateur Golf Title

## St. Paul Player Beats Chicago Golfer, One Up

Minnesota Champion Rallies in Afternoon Round to Win After Being Four Down at 24th.

Chicago, July 26.—H. R. Johnston of St. Paul today won the western amateur golf championship at Hinsdale by defeating Albert Seckel of Chicago, 1 up in 36 holes.

Johnston, after being down most of the day, largely because he could not hole any long puts, came with a rush in the last nine and could not be denied. The Minnesota champion had his worst sinking spell in the middle of the afternoon round, Seckel becoming four up at the end of the 24th hole and again being four up at the 31th.

## Yanks to Retain Athletic Title

New York, July 26.—Harry Cross, sports mentor, says that the world's title in athletics is likely to remain with this country for several more Olympics. The youth of this country starts its athletic development early and the boy wonders are likely to be discovered at any time on any school athletic field.

There are more athletes available for competition here than anywhere else. Physical education has reached a high point in our schools and colleges. The athletes here start early, are developed quickly, do their brilliant deeds early, and are gone while others just as brilliant come up to take their places.

It has been said that our intensive methods burn up the energy of our athletes too quickly. That may be true in some cases, but our comprehensive methods of coaching and training are so perfected that the talent of the athlete is brought out and developed in such a remarkably short space of time that the life of the athlete is short in comparison with that of the foreign athlete.

It must be noted, however, that countries like Spain, Argentina and even Finland have taken some lessons out of the books of the Americans, and that hereafter the latter will have to reckon with them seriously in the field of international sports.

## Ty Cobb Would Be Surgeon if He Had Time Over

Toronto, July 26.—"If I had my time over again, I would probably be a surgeon instead of a baseball player," said Ty Cobb, famous baseball player, who is visiting here today. "I am quite satisfied to stay as I am, however," he added, "and I have only one regret. That is the fact that I shall not have done any real good to humanity when I retire. I suppose everybody will have forgotten me in a few years' time."

"The Georgia Peach" advocated the spread of baseball all over the world and said that he looked forward to the day when England would take to the game.

"The English are especially suited to it," he said. "I hope to see it played nationally in all parts of the empire one of these days."

Cobb substantiated statements made by him that he would retire from the game after this season.

"Yes," he said, "I shall not play regularly after this year. I shall play a few odd games, of course, but I shall follow no fixed schedule."

## Notre Dame May Play California in Intersectional Clash in 1925

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 26.—Intimating that he will return to this section next year and bring with him his famous Notre Dame gridiron machine for a great intersectional clash against the University of Southern California, Knute K. Rockne, noted coach of the "fightin'" Irish, left today for his home in South Bend, Ind.

Although definite arrangements for such a contest have not yet been completed, Rockne admitted that negotiations for a football argument against the Trojans

in December, 1925, have been going on for a week, and said he was taking back a mighty favorable report to the board of athletic control at Notre Dame.

"It's up to the athletic board to sanction such a clash," said Rockne. "However, I will make a favorable report on such a game. I feel pretty certain we will be out here next year."

"I wasn't so strong for a game in southern California this year, owing to the fact that I will have a great team, and when Notre Dame plays in the best we can produce."

"I don't say that Notre Dame can beat a coast team, but I will say we will give 'em a fight."

Rockne asserted the problem of bringing an eastern team to California for a sectional struggle was a tough one, owing to the fact that the change in climate usually went hard on the eastern players.

## Black Gold May Meet Epinard in Match Race

Past Performances Convince Horsemen That Oklahoma Colt Should Have First Call in Latonia Event.

EW YORK, July 26.—One of Epinard's three engagements at the American turf next fall is a \$50,000 test of one mile and a quarter at Latonia, Ky. Prior to that event the French champion will measure stride with our best eastern horses at Belmont park and Aqueduct.

Such American thoroughbreds as Ordinance, Ladkin, Wise Counsellor, Zev, Grey Lag, Mad Hatter, in Memoriam, Chacoret, Chillowie, My Own and Black Gold have been mentioned as the leading eligibles for the match to select Epinard's opponents.

Black Gold is owned by Mrs. R. M. Hoots, an Indian woman, who resides in Tulsa, Okla. The colt, which was bred by Mrs. Hoots, first attracted attention as the winner of the Louisiana Derby at Jefferson Park, New Orleans, last March. Two months later he won the \$20,000 Kentucky Derby at Churchill Downs, a splendid achievement which rated him among the best 3-year-olds in training.
