

Wheat Suffers Further Loss in Erratic Session Weakness in Winnipeg and Expectation of Continued Setback Hold Support in Check.

Chicago, July 30.—Wheat emerged with further losses today after a session of erratic swings. Relative weakness in Winnipeg, due to a better feeling over crop prospects in that country, and disposition to look for a continuation of the market's backward trend started by influences that held support in check most of the day.

Wheat closed 1/4 to 1/2 lower; corn was 1/4 to 1/2 lower; oats were 1/4 to 1/2 lower. Houses with eastern connections were considerably more active than in the morning. The local market was in a bearish frame of mind and pressure from the west was considerable. A fair recovery took place late in the afternoon, but the market was not firm.

There was talk in the day that the northwest wheat belt, this having been placed on the ground by the unusually inclement weather. The crop outlook in that section is reported to be probably 100 per cent improved over this time a year ago.

Forecast for probable frost in parts of Canada caused some comment. The day had it rains so improved crop prospects that upwards of 300,000 bushels of wheat are being looked for. American wheat in the prairie provinces would be expected to reach 500,000 bushels.

Country selling of new wheat has been liberal in the southwest, but so far little. The movement of wheat to Kansas City is being increased, but reports from there have it that the demand is good.
