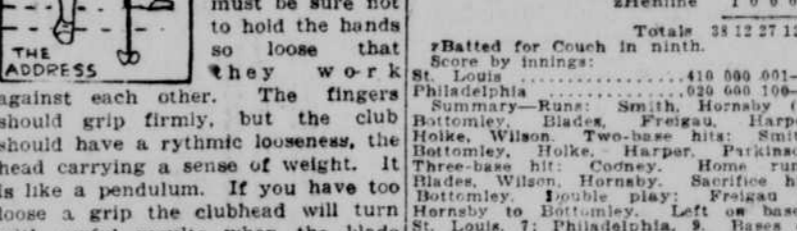

Down the Fairway

GRIP this club with a little of the leather showing. The mid-way grip is best—a little shorter grip for near distances. The grip should be in the fingers and not the palm. It should be easy, with both hands close together. My thumbs are down the shaft, only a narrow inner part of them resting on it. There is another reason for shortening the grip at times for then it will give you a better hitting feeling and it also allows you to keep your hands back of the vertical line more easily. You must be sure not to hold the hands so loose that they work against each other. The fingers should grip firmly, but the club should have a rhythmic looseness, the head carrying a sense of weight. It is like a pendulum. If you have too loose a grip the clubbed will turn with awful results when the blade hits ball and so.



THE ADDRESS

The ball should be played about off the left heel. Sometimes it is a good idea to play it a bit forward, but never play it so far back that most of your weight is on your right foot. Try to get your feet in an easy position behind the ball, and then stand at a medium distance from it. Should you want to get a higher flight, come nearer to the ball. This is also a good idea on a high wind.

The arms should be a little crooked at the elbow—if not equal the right should be more so than the left. Find a comfortable, medium upright position of the body, well balanced and relaxed, yet steady enough to prevent the wind from blowing you off balance. As you will find at times that you have been bending over the ball too much, and if so stand a little more upright for good results. Think I have made some of my very best shots standing up almost straight. Think of the ball as stationary, and do not let your club head swing at the ball. The imaginary direction line, then start the motion of your stroke. Be sure not to work around to a too open stance unless you allow your feet to get too close together. Just for a suitable count, if your stance does not feel firm you are not spreading out your feet enough. The position of the ball off the left heel should be as comfortable as there is a free movement of the independent arms in the front.

There is no stance which will give you better direction than any other. Secure yourself until you find it. It seems natural at first, but you may find it is only one place they belong and that is on the ball. Your toes should be
