

Flour Prices to Rise With Wheat

Canned Goods Climbing Up Scale Also—Canning Season at Height.

With wheat on a continued upward trend it is but natural that flour should take the same course in price. The increase in the price of flour is called to the attention of the market

shoppers, who are urged to buy their flour now.
Canned goods also are climbing. One market head, in discussing the canned goods situation, stated that he found it necessary to pay from 10 to 20 per cent more for his fall supply of various canned edibles.
The canning season being at its height, the markets are putting forth every effort to make the canning labor easier for the housewife. "Certo," a concentrated fruit pectin, is being demonstrated. This product is taken from the purest of fruits in which pectin is abundant. With the use of "Certo" the housewife can use any fruit, be it ripe or unripe, and prepare a jelly par excellence in a short time. It comes bottled and sells for 25 cents the bottle.
California Peaches Good.
Differences of opinion as to where the best peaches are grown are strong. However, it may be said safely, that the California peaches are the finest on the market, both for eating and canning purposes, because in these peaches the stone comes out more free. They have a red center and turn into a very tempting golden yellow when cooked. Another feature of California peaches is the fact that cooking does not rob their firmness. California peaches are always packed in paper, two layers to the crate. At present they are abundant and the most economical

being quoted as low as 98 cents a crate. The season is short for these peaches and canning should not be delayed.
A large crop of southern peaches is expected soon. Those on the market today are selling for \$2.75 a bushel basket.
The last opportunity for canning red raspberries comes this week. They are quoted from 12½ cents to 15 cents a box. Blackberries are plentiful for 20 cents a box.
Large Oranges Scarce.
Large oranges are very scarce this year. However, the small ones are abundant and sweet, as well as economical. Taking their weight into consideration, they retail for about half the price of the large ones. Lemons, too, can be bought more cheaply than last year.
Green apples are coming in fast and range in price from 25 cents to 60 cents a market basket. Extra large California apples are on the market for 50 cents a dozen. Pears are 30 cents a basket, and seedless grapes, two pounds for 25 cents. A rise in price of cantaloups is noted, practically all being shipped in from Turlock, Cal.
Cabbage and beets are probably the most abundant of vegetables today. Beets can be bought in extra large bunches for 10 cents or in market baskets for as low as 35 cents. Sweet

corn is coming in better and is cheaper. Home-grown cauliflower and green peas are now off the market, having been replaced by the Denver crop. Green and wax beans are all home grown and can be purchased very cheaply.
Tomatoes are still scarce and will be so for the next two weeks, at which time the home-grown crop will be on the market. All tomatoes being sold now come from Kansas and Missouri.
Three Seek Nomination.
Table Rock, Aug. 1.—George S. Flory of Pownee City, Mrs. Murray Smith and Miss Minnie Monasmith have applied for the place on the republican ballot as candidate for clerk of the district court, made vacant by the resignation of Miss Fay Brooks, the incumbent. The law empowers the county central committee to fill the vacancy and the appointment will be made by the committee August 5.

York Boys Go to Camp.
York, Aug. 1.—A number of York boys left Thursday for Camp Sheldon, where they will enjoy an outing for the next two weeks. A. H. Hiltner, "Y" secretary, accompanied the boys to camp, and Rev. Paul Payne, pastor of the Presbyterian church, will act as sponsor.

PAWNEE SUFFERS WATER FAMINE

Pawnee City, Neb., Aug. 1.—An order has been issued by the mayor and city council that water shall not be used for watering lawns or gardens, or washing cars, or for other purposes not absolutely necessary.
The order was issued as a result of the water shortage, which occurred when sand stopped the flow in the city wells. Men are now pumping sand out of the wells and may have one of them working in a short time.
Dry weather has caused Turkey creek to stop flowing and it is impossible to get a supply from that source to tide the city over until the wells could be repaired.
Herman Klentschy, superintendent of the municipal power and water plant, has started a new well, and this should be producing in a short time.

2 cups peaches or pears 1 cup water
