

Scouts From 19 Nebraska Towns at State Camp

Norfolk's 24 Representatives
Are Largest Delegation;
Scouting Program in
Full Swing.

Columbus, Neb., August 2.—The
Nebraska state boy scout camp, being
held at Camp Sheldon is filled to over-
flowing with scouts registered from
19 towns in the state.

Norfolk, with 24 boys and four
leaders has the largest single dele-
gation in camp. Other large groups
are from Orleans, Aurora, Silver
Creek, Albion, Osceola and Stanton.
Grant Johnson, the scoutmaster from
Orleans brought 12 of his scouts
more than 200 miles to camp. The
other towns represented are Ord,
York, Shelby, Stromsburg, Geneva,
Ansel, Geneva, Battle Creek, Nebras-
ka City, Columbus and Central City.

to the scouting program.

the Norfolk Y. M. C. A., is director

Shoji Osato Refutes Williams' Charges

Former Omaha Photographer
Says Japanese Association
Does Much Good.

Shoji Osato, former Omaha photog-
rapher, who now lives in Evanston,
Ill., with Mrs. Osato and their two
children, has made statements to the
Evanston News-Index to refute asser-
tions made in a recent lecture by
Prof. Edward T. Williams of "The
Japanese."

"Inference has been given to Amer-
icans that the Japanese association
is harmful, dangerous and something
that should be eradicated," was the
statement made by Osato. Mr. Osato
returned last November from Japan
after being lost in the district ruined
by the earthquake in Yokohama and
Tokio. Although he has been a resident
in America for a good many
years, he is well acquainted with the
present Japanese situation. He con-
sider the Japanese exclusion a closed
incident, according to his statements.

"The Japanese association started
years ago in San Francisco by six
Japanese students who were stran-
gers in a strange land," said Osato.
"The association grew in numbers,
but until very recently the Japanese
government may not have known of
its existence. The consuls in this
country turned to the association for
assistance in getting information
about the Japanese who asked for
passports to return home and for data
in the army registration of Japanese
here still eligible to call to service."

"The association keeps others in-
formed to conform with the laws of
this country. The association helps
the American-born Japanese child to
become a good American citizen and
the Japanese-born citizen here to live
as a good citizen, even though he is
denied citizenship. It is an inter-
mediary between the foreign-born in-
dividual and the United States gov-
ernment. The professor misjudged
the Japanese government and maligns
the Japanese association that really is
more American than Japanese in its
efforts and work."

"Grave injustice is done to further
spread the professor's narrow views
to American readers who have al-
ready been prejudiced by other Cal-
ifornians against us."

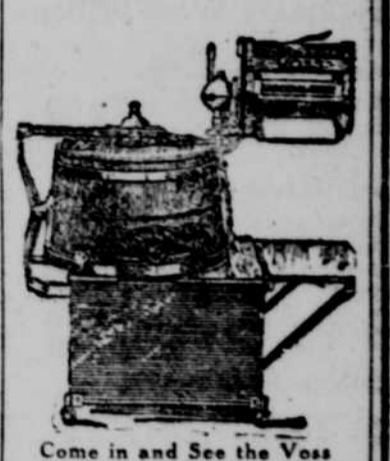
