Fraternity Boys on Stand in Morning Session of Franks Trial.

Loeb passed rapidly through the witness box in Judge Caverly's court today and told of the "queerness" that characterized both youths in school. It was all "lay" testimony to back up the "expert" testimony from the alienists and psychiatrists that Babe and Dickie were mentally diseased when they attempted to commit the "perfect crime" by kidnaping and murdering 14-year-old Bobby Franks.

STORMS RAGE IN THREE STATES
