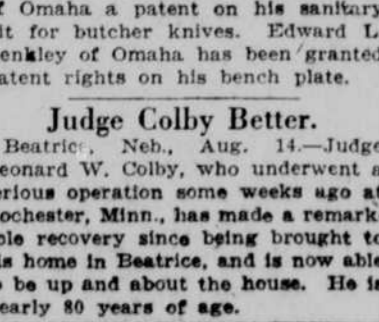
Charge Butler Not Progressive.

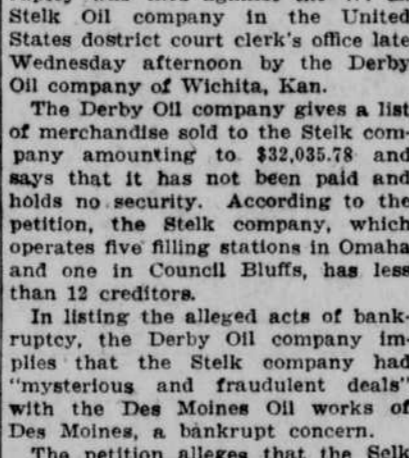
