

Evanston, Ill., Aug. 15 .- Republi can Candidate for Vice President Charles G. Dawes hit out from the shoulder here tonight. Three issles, the fundamental principles of our constitution," the league of nations and the world court were the chief issues discussed in the address of acceptance by General Dawes.

Mr. Dawes was notified of his omination by A. W. Jefferis, a former representative from Nebraska, who placed him in nomination at the Cleveland convention and his response was heard by a large outpouring of republicans from the middle west and by thousands of his neighbors and friends in Evanston, and by delegations from nearby Chicago. They turned out despite a rain that had fallen most of the day, drenching the lawn of the Dawes' home which stretches away to a park fronting on Lake Michigan.

Butler, chairman of the republican national committee, presided: Frank W. Stearns of Boston, close personal friend of President Coolidge, and Edward T.
