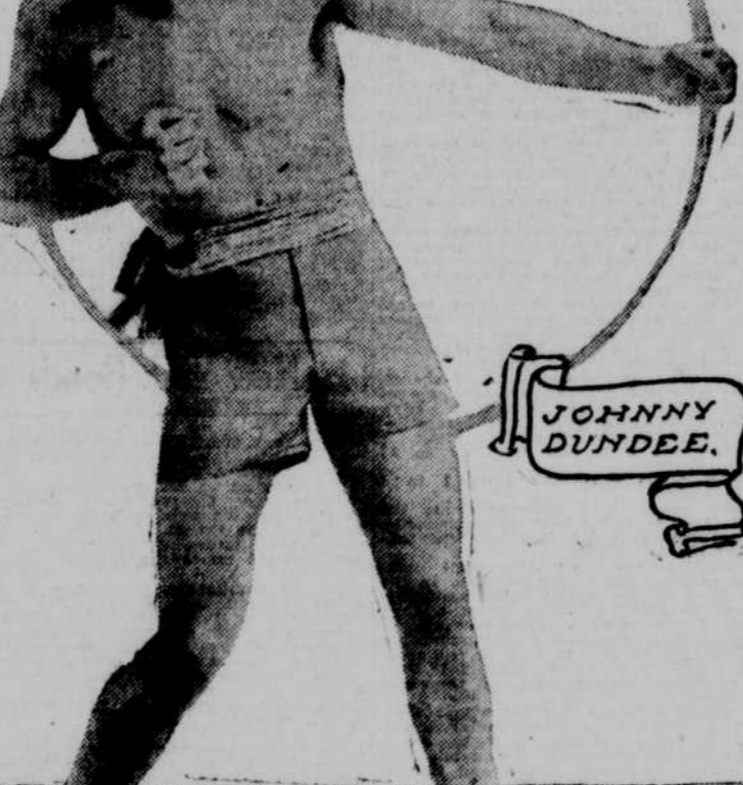
## Flagstead Stars as Red Sox Trim Indians, 5 to 4

## GOOD HEALTH IS DUE TO TANLAC TREATMENT

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Countless men and women could arrange their affairs to use this idle time. There are a few private courses accessible to permit of late afternoon golf but they are in the minority. Such courses could adopt a modification of this idea and install a morning membership plan, limiting the playing time of such members to the first five mornings of the week. It is surely a matter for great regret that a golf course, costing many, many thousands of dollars to build is, under the present system, merely a part-time plant.  
 Out on the course there is the sound of the mowers, the smell of freshly cut grass; overhead the glorious sun, underfoot the spring air, in inviting fairways and putting greens—and all unused so much of the time. It seems a pity! And apart from the community good fostered by this five-day membership plan, or even its modification—the morning membership plan—the cost and upkeep of the golf course, which in, in these days, working a hardship on many members of golf clubs, would be reduced.  
 Of course the fee for the five-day golf club membership, or even the morning membership, would be much less than a full membership, but the aggregate would be a tremendous financial factor of the club maintenance, in addition to giving a greater number of people the joy of the game.  
 There are those who will say that the course will suffer from such heavy daily use. This, I think, is an unnecessary fear. Naturally, judgment will have to be used in deciding the number of such memberships a club is justified in selling. This will vary with the particular course and the use made of it. Where there are many women players and where an unusually large number of tournaments are held the membership would have to be restricted so that on tournament days the course would be open for only a few hours. In my opinion marks the greatest opportunity for good from this idea has come to the front in many a day. Let us encourage the grand old game and make it democratic and unswayed.



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
