Carlson, Union Pacific agent here, which had been parked at the curb. The touring car turned completely over. Miss Blackburn, who was injured about the back and shoulders, was taken to a hospital.

### Syracuse Paves Streets

Syracuse, Neb., Sept. 3.—Syracuse completed 22 blocks of paving Monday and council passed an ordinance creating an additional district which will give a mile and a half of paving and connect the Harding highway at opposite corners of the town with hard-surfaced streets.

### Valley Fair Successful

Ord, Neb., Sept. 3.—Valley county fair proved a financial success. For two or three years previously the fair had been a losing proposition financially. The managers are preparing for a bigger and better fair next year.

### We Have With Us Today

Sixteen years ago, at Denver, Colo., when W. J. Bryan was nominated the third time, by I. J. Dunn of Omaha, three Omaha Henrys attended that convention. One was Henry Keating, now a resident of Riverton, Wyo., and visiting the folks back in the old home town.

Mr. Keating is now president of the Farmers' Lumber company of Riverton and he is a member of the town council. The good news he brings from his district is that the cattle and sheep men have been raising themselves out of the slough of despond into which they sank in 1920. ### Gasoline Price Cut Demanded at Aurora

Aurora, Neb., Sept. 3.—Sentiment in favor of the installation of an independent gasoline station was found to be extremely strong at a meeting of the chamber of commerce and unions operating filling stations here, action will be taken soon. Gasoline is said to be selling at Central City for 13 cents and in other places as low as 10 and 11 cents. The price here is still 17 cents at most stations.

### Rock Island Reduces Force of Telegraphers

DeWitt, Neb., Sept. 3.—Effective at once, the Rock Island railway has ordered the operator at the station here removed. It is said the railway has taken off 40 operators on the Nebraska division, between Council Bluffs and Denver, most of them at stations where more than one man was employed, the move being a retrenchment in operating expenses.

### Many Nebraskans to Go to Legion Convention

Norfolk, Sept. 3.—Many members of the American Legion and American Legion auxiliary here are making reservations on special trains at Sioux City and Omaha which will take the veterans to the St. Paul convention on September 16. Frank A. Worner, a member of the national legislative committee, has returned from St. Paul, where he has been working on the housing program, and reports arrangements made to take care of a record-breaking crowd of visitors. He reports that the Nebraska delegation will probably be the largest.

### Teacher Dies in Presence of Sunday School Class

Creston, Neb., Sept. 3.—E. O. Witter, 72, died here just after he had finished teaching his Sunday school class, existing with a bubble in his head. Heart trouble was the cause of death.

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### Powers Ready to Land

Huang Tu, China, Sept. 3.—On a 15-mile front extending on either side of this little Chinese village, the long imminent menace of civil war between the provinces of Kiangsu and Chekiang flamed into action today with the result that tonight found 500 dead and more than 1,000 wounded strewn over the countryside.
