

### Train Whistles Ineffective, Say Road Engineers

Sirens Should Be Nearer Front. Claim; Recent Wreck on Save Girl Cited.

The failure of little Margaret Dughman of Central City to hear the whistle sounded by a Union Pacific engineer, John Lawhon, as his freight train bore down on her last week, has resulted in some controversy as to whether locomotive whistles are properly placed to be most effective.

E. A. Hamilton, veteran Union Pacific conductor, suggests that locomotive whistles might be more effective if placed on the front of the engine. He contends that the sound of the whistle on a speeding train, emanating from the dome of the engine, is thrown to the rear and is often not heard by those in front of the train.

**Failed to Hear.**

When Engineer Lawhon saw the Dughman girl walking on the track in front of his train he whistled several times, but she failed to hear the sound. He then threw on the air, bringing the train to a crashing halt which wrecked two or three box cars. Had the girl heard the whistle she would have had time to step from the track and the sudden stop would have been unnecessary, the engineer said.

Railroad officials here are inclined to defend the present position of the whistle, however. They declare it is on the dome of the engine because that has been proven the best place for it.

"Of course we are anxious to avoid all crossing accidents," said H. W. Guild of the Union Pacific. "But there is some doubt about whether the sound would carry better if the position of the whistle was changed. Besides such a change might be fraught with mechanical difficulties.

**Other Officials Skeptical.**

"The present position of the whistle is the result of many years of practice and experimenting," said C. L. Gray of the Burlington. "To place it up in front of the boiler would probably require a pipe line carrying steam.

"In its present position the whistle is located exactly where there is maximum steam pressure. Hence the whistle gives a maximum sound and is sure to work. The pipe line might get out of order in cold weather and the engineer might find his whistle disabled in an emergency. Of course we like new ideas and this one might result in experiments."

Mr. Gray contends that the sound from the whistle is thrown into the air, and that the speed of the train does not affect it. In order to cut down crossing accidents the Burlington is placing additional whistling posts so that engineers must start whistling a long distance from crossings and continue almost constantly until they reach the crossing, he announced.
