

# Buffaloes Rally in Eighth Inning and, Aided by Lenahan's Homer, Win

## Oklahoma City Loses First of Series by 4 to 2

### Thompson Steal Home With Winning Run in Eighth; Double-Header Scheduled Today.

Two errors on the part of McNally, second sacker, and Kahdot, shortstop cost Oklahoma City yesterday and the Buffaloes, aided by a fourth jolt by (Hap) Lenahan, handed the Indians a 4 to 2 trimming.

The veteran, Oklahoma City, led the batting for the first time in the series, allowing Jack Holland's men but seven blows four of which came in the sixth inning and accounted for the loser's only runs.

(Buckshot) May did the flinging for the visitors and twirled a game except for the eighth frame when the hired hands of Barney Burch marked up three runs on Lenahan's homer, Kahdot's wild throw of Wilder's grounder, Bailey's sacrifice, Thompson's double and a double steal by Thompson and Cullop. Cullop reached first on four balls.

The herd broke into the scoring column first in the last of the fourth when McNally kicked Robinson's easy grounder half way back to the Omaha dugout. Cullop then fled out to Thompson in center field Robinson stole second and scored a moment later when Wilcox sent a single to left field.

Oklahoma City went ahead in the sixth by making two scores on a single by Hagerman, bunt by Thompson, McDaniel's single and a double by McNally. Hagerman and Thompson scored in this round and McDaniel would have crossed the plate, had he been called out for not touching third base.

After Lenahan, the first hitter of the eighth frame for Omaha, poled a circuit clout over the right fielder, Wilder was safe on Kahdot's error. He advanced to second on Bailey's sacrifice. Thompson's double scored Wilder. The Buff's second sacker, Kahdot, hit a "Buckshot" uncocked a wild rick. After Robinson, Kahdot, Cullop was issued a free ticket to first by the generous May. Thompson counted the final run of the contest from third when he and Cullop pulled a double steal much to the surprise of catcher Fitzpatrick.

This afternoon the same teams will play double-header, the first game starting at 2 p. m. The second game will be played at 7:30 p. m. Frank Osborn, Buffalo left fielder, was out of the lineup due to an injury to one of his fingers. He will be back at his old place in left field this afternoon.
