Miss Badollet formerly lived here and on Monday her hostesses invited her for an informal afternoon a few of her old friends.

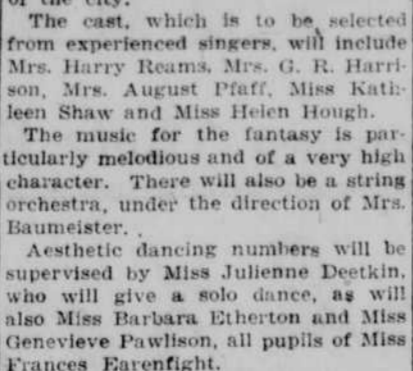

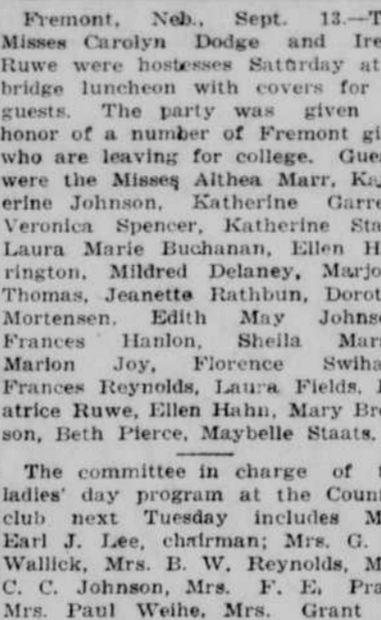
