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"During 1923 we paid \$93,932 toward the maintenance and operation of the public schools.

"We bear a large part of the expense of running this community. If we had no taxes to pay, the same as municipally-owned public utilities, our extremely low rates could be even lawer. However, taxes must be raised, and since the municipallyowned companies do not pay any taxes, their share must be made up by the balance of the taxpayers."

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
