

Big Carnival Will Open "Ak" Fall Festival

Huge Electrical Parade October 1, Military Review October 2; Street Shows Start September 23.

The gates of the empire of Ak-Sar-Ben will be thrown open to the world at 1 p. m. next Tuesday.

His royal highness, Ak-Sar-Ben XXX, is already preparing his royal carnival city at Fifteenth street and Capitol avenue, and he wants immigrants to his realm.

There will be no Ellis Island. Any one who can show a broad grin in good working order is eligible to enter the kingdom by sea or rail and set himself up in the business of having a good time.

"Bullifornia" is the name of the capital city, and the fact that this name is not to be found in the atlas will not prevent it from being one of the liveliest spots in the empire from September 23 to October 4.

Palms Grow Over Night. Palms and tropical plants are springing up overnight through the asphalt, and swarms of the most beautiful bathing girls ever seen outside a Mack Sennett film will be there.

The Lachman exposition shows will provide amusement for his majesty's subjects with tent shows, a dog and pony show, six "rides," and a troupe of the wildest western riders who ever wore chaps.

parade which is expected to outdo any ever held by the monarchs of Ak-Sar-Ben.

Military Parade October 2.

The next event on the program will be a great military parade at noon, October 2. Among the organizations which will march will be the 17th infantry, 9th field artillery, 14th cavalry, detachment of the 144th infantry of the Nebraska National Guards, detachment of the organized reserve corps, Creighton university battalion of the R. O. T. C., Central High school cadets and the United States army motor transportation corps.

The parade will be followed by the second annual track and field meet of the Seventh army corps area, to be held in the afternoon at Ak-Sar-Ben field. In addition to track and field events, there will be an exhibition of the 16th aerial observation squadron of Fort Riley, Kan., artillery demonstrations and drills, cavalry musical drills and an exhibition of jumping horses. The entire exhibition will be free.

Polo Tournament. The midwest polo tournament will be at Ak-Sar-Ben field on the fol-

lowing schedule, to continue for five days. Seven teams will compete for the George Brandels trophy and cup. The teams already entered include those of Fort Riley, Kan.; Fort Snelling, Minn.; Fort Des Moines, Ia.; Fort Robinson, Neb.; Fort Meade, S. D.; the Wakonda civilian team of Des Moines and the Ak-Sar-Ben team.

The annual Ak-Sar-Ben ball will be held at the den on the evening of October 3.

Ak-Sar-Ben will present its first annual horse show as a new feature of the fall festival on the afternoon and evening of October 4. Army owned mounts for prizes in all classes for gaited saddle horses, pony, heavy draft and driving horses. Entries in all classes may be made with Col. Frank Halstead at the Army building.

Special Railroad Fares.

Wednesday, October 1, will be Rosebud day at the festival. A special train will bring 150 business men and their wives from Rosebud, with the Rosebud band, on September 30. The band will take part in the electrical parade on October 1.

All railroads will offer round-trip tickets for one and one-half of the one-way fare from September 25 to October 6. These fares are offered from

all Nebraska points and from towns outside Nebraska where the one-way fare is \$6, or less.

VOTE HUNT NOT FARM AID---DAWES

should be discussed—on the basis of the facts and the proper conclusions to be drawn from them, and not from the standpoint of politics." "I note that Mr. Davis, in his Omaha speech, discusses the question chiefly as a political problem," Mr. Dawes continued. "He says: 'If we eliminate from political debate every question that is either national in its scope or economic in its character, we will reach that millennium when government through political parties will cease to exist.' He therefore maintains, in general, that the democratic party will solve the agricultural problem."

Must Not Sidestep. "Now, no one can make a proper statement of the facts involved in the proper solution of the agricultural problem without referring to some of the involved and conflicting economic interests of our people. The course of the politician, in discussing the solution, is primarily from the standpoint of getting votes. The proper course is that discussion which may

result in a constructive solution without side-stepping embarrassing facts in certain localities to gain votes. "Mr. Davis, for political purposes, has seized upon a reference which I made in my Lincoln speech, to the tendency of reclamation and irrigation projects to increase the supply of agricultural products, which under the law of supply and demand, tends to increase the selling price of farm products, and which must be studied in any honest economic consideration of the problem. Evidently he does not regard political commitment, before a full and careful consideration of all the elements involved in the problem, as injurious to the chances for progress towards the proper and economic solution of agricultural difficulties. If so, I agree with him."

Must Be Out of Politics. "The non-partisan, economic and practical agricultural commission which the president is about to appoint in an endeavor to find a solution of a complex and difficult question, will face numerous situations of this kind in which there are conflicting interests. The farmers desire high prices for beef on the hoof; the consumers desire low prices for what they buy, while the farmer justly demands higher prices for what he sells. "In its endeavor to reach a proper

solution of this national problem, the commission can not start in as the politicians do with pledges to conflicting interests, designed to satisfy both sides in advance. This would mean certain failure. "My objection to putting the agricultural problem in politics is that it involves wholesale preliminary commitments from candidates after votes in certain localities, which tends to preclude, afterwards, impartial consideration of constructive remedies for the agricultural industry as a whole."

WIFE WINS SECOND DIVORCE IN YEAR

Claire Dickson, Ninety-third and Franklin streets, was awarded her second divorce in slightly more than a year Friday in domestic relations court, from Raymond Dickson, on cruelty grounds.

Meet May Go to Night Sessions

Strenuous Life Lays Leaders Low; May End October 1.

Geneva, Sept. 19.—Indications are that the present assembly of the league of nations will continue until the first week in October and to make adjournment possible even by that time the commissions must hold night sittings to get through with the agenda.

The work of framing a protocol on arbitration and security and preparing for an international conference for the reduction of armaments has made the assembly one of the most important in the history of the league and the labor entailed in preparing the way for the necessary agreements render the delegates' life a strenuous one.

Weather Fine. Few, if any, of those taking part in the assembly have had an opportunity to enjoy the gorgeous weather

now prevailing in Geneva, for most of them are closeted throughout the day and far into the night in the commission rooms and hotels, ceaselessly striving to reconcile conflicting views and reach a common center.

Already this strenuous life has laid low several of the league's intellectual laborers. Former Premier Briand of France is confined to his room with the grippe and digestive trouble. Lord Parmoor, head of the British delegation, has a bad throat and is scarcely able to speak, having overworked his vocal organs in the unceasing discussions; Leon Bourgeois, already somewhat feeble with age, has had to curb his activities because of the danger of overdoing, and Dr. Combe De La Torriente of Cuba has been obliged to relinquish his place on the subcommittee of 12 because of indisposition. Several others are also beginning to feel the strain of over-application to duty.

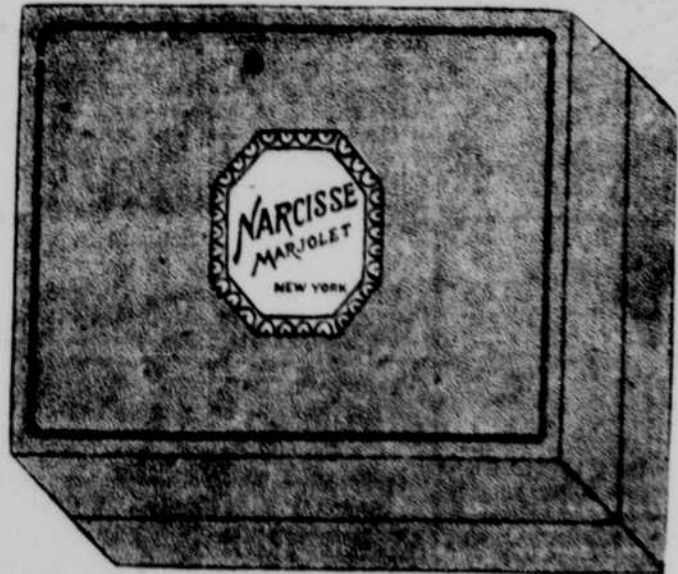
