

**Wilbur Arrives to See Coolidge; Refuses to Talk**  
Navy Secretary, Called Back From Inspection Tour, to Confer With President.

Washington, Sept. 19.—Arriving in Washington late today, Secretary Wilbur refused to comment upon any of the events which led to the termination of his western inspection tour upon request from the White House.

Surrounded by newspaper men when he left his train here the secretary would only say that he intended to get in touch with the White House as soon as he had gone to his residence and "washed up." To all questions he simply shook his head.

Secretary Wilbur, shortly after his arrival, however, talked by phone with C. Bascom Slomp, secretary of the president and arranged to confer with the president at 10 tomorrow morning. Mr. Slomp told the secretary the president would be glad to see him either tonight or tomorrow and the latter date was set.

After communicating with the White House and stopping briefly at his residence, the secretary went to his office at the department where he held a short conference with Assistant Secretary Roosevelt and Rear Admiral Strauss, the budget officer of the navy. Admiral Strauss went to Harpersburg this morning to meet Mr. Wilbur and accompanied him back to Washington so he could give him latest details of the controversy between the department and Budget Director Lord.

The return of Mr. Wilbur, ends, at least, a week ahead of schedule, a tour of naval stations on the west coast which already had occupied more than a month. Unusual importance was attached to the termination of the trip when Mr. Wilbur announced that he had been requested by President Coolidge to return for important conferences and jumped by airplane to a junction point where he could overtake a transcontinental train.

In a White House statement, it was declared, the budget as it affected the navy, was the subject upon which Mr. Wilbur's views were sought, but subsequently this was elaborated by a statement from a spokesman for the president who said other matters of importance concerning the navy would be taken up.

**HOT SPRINGS HIT BY BIG TORNADO**

Hot Springs, Ark., Sept. 19.—A tornado dipped to earth here late today demolishing the St. Luke Episcopal church and unroofing a portion of the Eastman hotel. No fatalities were reported early tonight.

The twister swept in from the Hot Springs National park, dipped into the city and then passed over Hot Springs mountain northeast of the city. In addition to wrecking the church and damaging the Eastman hotel, the wind destroyed the cottage home of Mrs. G. A. Bates, damaged the Glenwood hotel and scattered automobiles about the streets. Numerous buildings were slightly damaged.

**G. O. P. Ignores "Bob's" Outburst**

Coolidge to Meet Cabinet and Perhaps Wilbur Today.

Washington, Sept. 19.—A meeting with his cabinet, the regular semi-weekly session, constituted the principal business before President Coolidge today. Later in the day Secretary Wilbur was expected to arrive here from California at the call of the president.

There was no comment at the White House in regard to the speech delivered in New York last night by Senator Hiram Folger, independent candidate, the president having made it clear that he would confine his discussion of politics to his occasional speeches. The next occasion on which he is expected to deal with political questions is in his address in Philadelphia next Thursday night.

Although Secretary Wilbur was expected to call at the White House upon his arrival, it was understood the president did not plan to take up with him today the pending naval questions which the White House has announced led to the request for his return.

**Wymore Builder Dies.**

Wymore, Neb., Sept. 19.—Jim W. Brown, 75, a resident of Wymore for the last 38 years, died at his home in southwest Wymore after a short illness. He was a carpenter and built many homes in Wymore. Mr. Brown was a member of Wymore Masonic lodge. He is survived by the widow, railway engineer, of Harrison, Kan.; John I. Brown, a Burlington railway conductor of Wymore, and one daughter, Mrs. Charles Janssen of Beatrice.

**Judge Fixes Date for Forbes Trial**

Hearing on Alleged Fraud in Veterans Bureau Begins October 14 in Chicago.

Chicago, Sept. 19.—The decision of Judge George A. Carpenter of the federal court today ruled down the defense plea of Col. Charles R. Forbes and John W. Thompson, jointly indicted on charges of conspiracy in the alleged veterans' bureau frauds, and ordered the trial date set at a hearing on October 14.

The defense, in a demurrer to the government charges, declared the indictments were faulty. This Judge Carpenter denied, saying: "The indictments are sufficiently clear for the average man to understand."

Conspiracy to defraud the government is such a broad term that it need not be couched in technical language, he added, advising the defense to be ready for trial in the near future.

He likewise denied the plea of the defense that a fair trial would be impossible because all political parties had made the veterans' bureau charges an issue.

Judge Carpenter declared there was no politics in his court. The government's case, charging Forbes and Thompson with conspiracy which cost the government \$225,000, is being prosecuted by John W. H. Crim, special assistant to Attorney General Stone.

Today's decision further denied the return of the books of the Thompson firm which were placed before the federal grand jury, to the defendants. They were ordered placed in the hands of United States Marshal Robert R. Levy and open to inspection by both prosecution and defense.
