Wilbur in Conferences.

After a conference with the president. Secretary Wilbur went to his office at the Navy department where he busied himself for the remainder of the day in conferences with his associates there on naval questions. including that of the budget which had brought disagreement with the berdget bureau.

Captain Gherardi's memorandum to the secretary said: "Aviation advance does not justify us in allowing our 18 battleships or any of them to deteriorate, using money thus saved to build up aviation."

"Three types of aircraft," he said, "should be developed: (A) flying boats for long range scouting and bombing; (B) amphibians and single pontoon planes for spotting and for close prosection of the fleet against submarine or destroyer attacks; (C) twin pontoon planes for torpedo planes but these should be considered as secondary to the first two."


