Universal Service Staff Correspondent Chicago, Sept. 26.—The velocity of light, which heretofore has been roughly estimated at 186,000 miles a second, has been commuted even more minutely.

The latest disclosures of Prof. A A. Michelson, head of the Physics department of the University of Chicago, and one of the foremost scientists in the world, show the velocity of light to be 330 miles a second more than heretofore be

As a result of his experiments and research work at Mt. Wilson observatory near Los Angeles, this summer, Professor Michelson today announced that he had definitely fixed the speed at which a ray of light travels at 186,330 miles

At that, Professor Michelson said today, he is not yet satisfied, but will continue his experiments to arrive at even more accurate fig-


