

"Silent" Carson, Bandit, Is Dead

Availing Death Sentence on Insanity Plea. He Was Dumb for 16 Years.

Stockton, Cal., Sept. 26.—"Silent" Carson, former notorious bandit, is dead. He died maintaining the silence he had preserved for 15 years and which had saved him from the gallows.

Charles Carson, whose real name was Corcoran, had a long prison record beginning in New York when he was 9 years old. Other terms in prison followed. While confined in the Polson (Cal.) penitentiary in 1907, he was one of seven convicts who captured Captain J. R. Murphy and guard Jolly and used them as shields in an attempted escape. Murphy and Jolly as well as all of the convicts were wounded, four of the prisoners fatally.

Carson was sentenced to be hanged for his part in this affair and in September, 1909, while occupying a cell in the condemned row awaiting execution, he suddenly stopped talking. No intelligible word ever was heard to pass his lips again.

He was subjected to many tests by alienists and finally in January, 1913, was declared insane and committed to the hospital for the insane here.

Consul Imbrie's Body in States

President to Attend Funeral Monday With Other High Officials.

By International News Service. Washington, Sept. 27.—President Coolidge, Secretary of States Hughes and other prominent officials of the government will attend the funeral services here Monday for Robert Imbrie.

Norfolk, Va., Sept. 27.—The United States cruiser Trenton, bearing the body of Robert Imbrie, American vice-consul at Teheran, Persia, slain by a fanatical mob there on July 18, passed Cape Henry early today. The Trenton passed through Lynnhaven roads, where units of the Atlantic squadron are anchored, each vessel dipped its colors in honor of the dead consul.

At Piney Point, Md., tomorrow, relatives of the dead consul and representatives of the State department will go on board the warship. Then the cruiser will go on to the Washington navy yard. Burial will be in Arlington National cemetery, Monday.

Consul Imbrie was beaten to death by a mob that was driven to fanatical fury, while he, in company with another American, was photographing a sacred fountain in the Persian capitol.

I am also advised today that the republican state organization and the Coolidge and Davies organization in California, of which Mark Regan is director, nor the national commission of California, nor republican officials connected with local campaign were parties in any manner to the proceedings in any way."
