

**Phone Radio  
in Germany**  
Government Tests Are Made  
of Device Invented by Ba-  
varian Scientist.

Munich, Aug. 27.—"Broadcasting by wire" is the latest German invention. It is said, and is likely to revolutionize the entire radio market.

In a demonstration to Bavarian government officials and press representatives, Dr. Steidle, the inventor, who is a Bavarian government official, declared he has solved the problem of broadcasting by wire. All

present listened in over the telephone on a perfect reproduction of the second act of Wagner's "Valkyrie," which is known as one of the most difficult pieces of orchestra music. Steidle had numerous microphones installed on the stage of the State opera and also with every desk of the orchestra. Amplified by electron tubes, microphone oscillations were relayed to the head telegraph station, whence they were transmitted to the regular telephone cables by a special switching device.

Listeners-in who wanted to receive or make regular telephone calls were disconnected automatically with the opera, and the connection was re-established automatically on demand. The city telephone service continued undisturbed while the performance was going on.

Dr. Steidle says that by means of

his invention every telephone client will be able to listen-in at any moment. He proposed to start running general broadcasting service over the telephone in October.

Successful tests with broadcasting by wire have also been made in various other parts of Germany. The German ministry of posts and telegraphs achieved good results in broadcasting by wire through establishing relay senders near high pressure current cable stations, without metallic connection. Communication by wire with various points has been achieved. It is said that the time is not far in every house or home where high-pressure current cable is at hand. This means that broadcasting would no longer require establishment of an antennae, but simply a receiver set.
