

### Boosters From Rosebud Region Arrive in City

Bring Band of 25 Pieces; to Take Part in Parade Tonight; Carry Banners Boosting Country.

The Rosebud region of South Dakota has invaded Omaha, the objective being the carnival sector. Sixty boosters arrived on special cars over the Chicago & Northwestern at 5:30 Tuesday night. An equal number arrived by automobile during the day and most of the band of 25 pieces already was here. If you see a man, woman or child wearing a white hat, you see an individual who will tell you that there is no place this side of Madagascar that is half so wonderful as the Rosebud country. A reception committee of Omaha men met the train and escorted the visitors to their several hotels. Among the materials brought to the

carnival by the South Dakota enthusiasts were a number of big placards. They were not modest in tone. The Rosebud people are in the city to prove beyond the shadow of a doubt that theirs is a 20th century Garden of Eden. Some of these placards read: "Good roads in the Rosebud country make miles seem shorter." "27,000 people in the Rosebud—room for 27,000 more." "Alfalfa is a sure crop—South Dakota seed in demand everywhere." "Rosebud potatoes keep longest. Harvested October 1. Fine condition July 15." "The Rosebud band, of 25 pieces, including five rosy-cheeked girls who lend charm to the musical organization, gave a radio program Tuesday night which was broadcast from station WOAW. This band will participate in the electrical parade Wednesday night." "Rosebud Day at Carnival. Wednesday has been officially designated as Rosebud day at the Ak-Sar-Ben carnival. The South Dakota boosters will be honored at a luncheon at the Chamber of Commerce at which J. F. Frame, a prominent attorney of Burke, S. D., will be the principal speaker. J. W.
