Plot to Throw Election into House is Bared

Democrats and La Follette Conspired Months Ago to Block Voters' Choice, Says Charge.

That the candidacy of Robert Marion La Follette was not the result of a sudden impulse, but had been determined upon many months before it was sprung.

That the possibility of throwing the election of president into congress was considered in councils at Washington for a long time before any convention was held.

That a complete and perfect understanding between the democrats and the La Follette group existed in congress and out of congress.

That the president's endeavors to get through laws that would help the country and improve the condition of agriculture were thwarted because of the conspiracy that had been entered into in advance of the coming together of congress in December last.

That John M. Nelson of Wisconsin, labeled a republican, was the known leader of this conspiracy in the house, and was then, as now, the active field director of the La Follette forces.

That Nelson aided in defeating the effort to unseat Sol Bloom, a New York representative, a democrat, because to give the seat to the contestant, a republican, would change New York from the democratic to the republican column in the case of an election in the house.

These charges are made by Congressman Willis G. Sears and sustained by records of the case of Chandler against Bloom, tried before elections committee No. 3 of the house of representatives, of which Richard C. Elliott of Indiana is chairman and Congressman Sears a member.

It is of interest to note, in passing, that John M. Nelson of Wisconsin is chairman of elections committee No. 2, and that a contest tried before his committee was not reported on at the last session.

That John M. Nelson of Wisconsin is chairman of the National Democratic Club, and a member of the La Follette bloc.

ZR-3 Crew Worn Out by Sea Flight

Big Zeppelin Is Cradled Safely in Lakehurst Airdrome After Record-Breaking Trip Across Atlantic.

By Associated Press. Lakehurst, N. J., Oct. 15.—The ZR-3 slumbered tonight, safely cradled in the Lakehurst airdrome after a memorable flight across an ocean.

The German crew slumbered, also, and its four American passengers. The dirigible, which had set a new record for sustained flight, appeared none the worse for the effort.

Official Record Kept. This was the official record, as computed by Dr. Hugo Eckener, commander of the dirigible and president of the Zeppelin interests.

The ship's log recorded that it left Friedrichshafen, Germany, at 6:25 a. m., on Sunday, October 12, the time being one hour east of Greenwich.

His charges against me are premeditatedly false. He has opened my mail, taken money entrusted to me, and I will fight him in the courts.

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Writs Fly in Battle of Factions

Otto Mutz, Deposed Chairman, and Frank Harrison, Successor, Both Seek Court Aid in Scrap

"Office" Moved Twice

Lincoln, Oct. 15.—Frank Harrison, regional director of the La Follette campaign, and Otto Mutz, deposed state chairman, whose "dismissal" Tuesday by Harrison has split the party wide open in Nebraska, took their quarrel to the courts this afternoon.

At 2 this afternoon, Mutz, armed with a writ of replevin issued by Justice of the Peace Stephens, moved the La Follette literature and account books from the headquarters established by Harrison.

New Rooms Prepared. Three blocks down the street was a clean swept suite of rooms waiting to receive the bundles of La Follette literature that line the walls of Harrison's office.

Complete supervision of the campaign will be in his hands, Mutz declared, but denied that he would insert himself in the struggles of any candidates other than La Follette and Wheeler.

While Mutz was issuing his manifesto of independence, draymen were hustling the packages of literature to the elevator.

Short, chunky, with a reputation as a hard fighter, Harrison smiled through it all beneath the smile showing a few teeth in the latest development in the La Follette internecine warfare would receive out to work.

Harrison Wilds Room. As each package moved out Harrison, armed with a broom, would sweep away his old seersucker coat, with a rip beneath one sleeve, jerking back and forth across his shoulders.

At last Mutz came into the office to make certain that nothing was overlooked. Harrison's only sign of recognition was to slowly halt the path of his broom until it was tapping vigorously up and down.

To Mutz, Harrison was a non-existent being. As Mutz moved from room to room, the two telegrams from national headquarters authorizing Harrison to take complete charge. Mutz ignored them.

Neighbors Amused. This tour of inspection completed Mutz moved back to his post at the elevator. Now packages were disappearing down the shaft, to reappear, for a moment on the street before turning to the next door.
