

Frisch, Kelly and Young Exonerated of All Connection With Baseball Scandal

Landis Gives Giant Players Clean Sailing

High Commissioner of Baseball Says O'Connell's Story Didn't Jibe With Circumstances at Time of Act.

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—Frank Frisch, George Kelly and Ross Young, New York Giant players, implicated by Jimmy O'Connell in the latter's attempted bribery of Heinie Sand, Philadelphia shortstop, were exonerated of all connection with the scandal by Commissioner Landis today.

O'Connell's story did not jibe with the circumstances at the time of his action.

This was disclosed today by a source close to Commissioner Landis and established for the first time the real reason why, apart from their own denials, Frisch, Kelly and Young were cleared in the investigation which preceded the world series.

According to this source, O'Connell's story of what happened before and after he approached Sand during the game at the Polo Grounds September 27, was diametrically opposite to the story related by Sand, and also the accounts given by the others called before Commissioner Landis.

Asked by Landis what he did after offering Sand \$500 to "throw" the game, O'Connell was said to have related that he walked to the batting cage and there told Kelly what happened. Then, O'Connell said, he took part in batting practice.

According to Sand, however, O'Connell did not approach any other player at once, but went to the bench and sat alone in one corner.

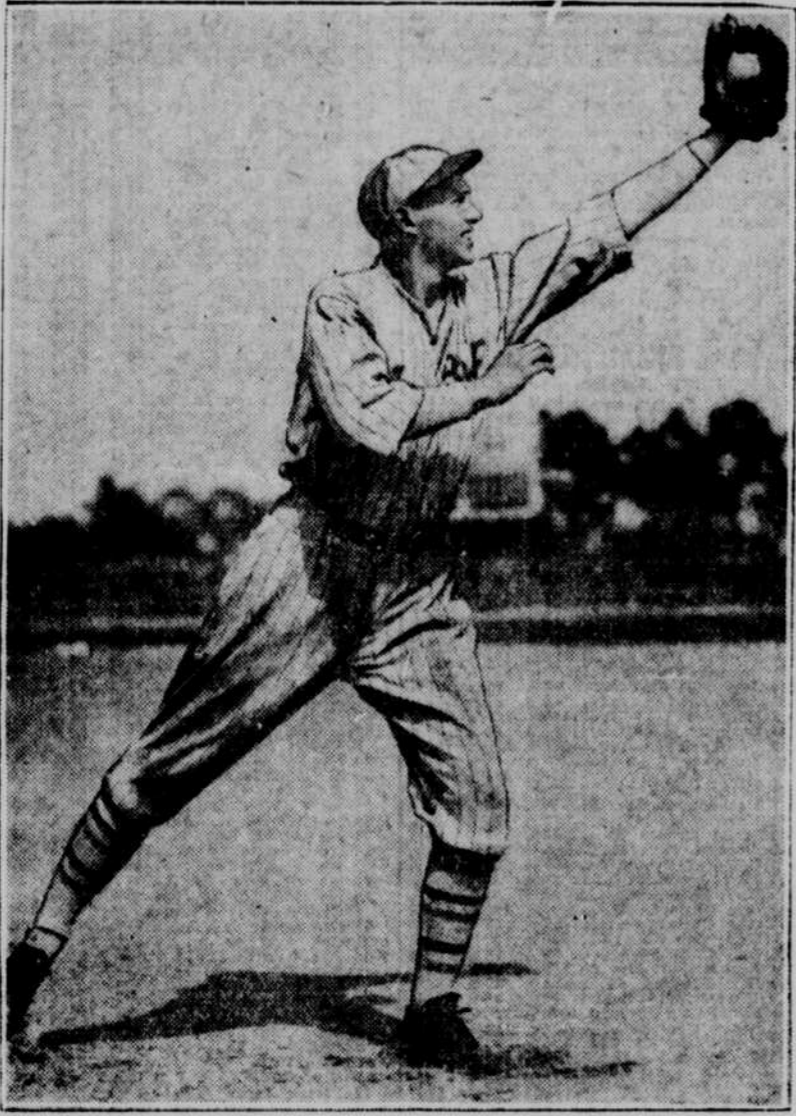

18-Year-Old Player Stars for Giants

Last week the kid from Chicago, after warming a bench all summer for the New York Giants, stepped forward and played such good baseball that the world is still talking about it.

All the world, that is it talking about Fred Lindstrom's baseball expert the folks who have lived for years over in "South Town"—that little district along West Twenty-sixth street where a few families of Irish and Swedish descent still cling to the homes they have lived in for years in spite of the encroachment of factory and industrial plants.

Fred Lindstrom, the Giants' "Cinderella," the wistful kid who was lifted from the dust of the dugout to the limelight of the world's series by Groh's injury, was born at 466 West Twenty-sixth street November 1, 1905. That makes him not yet 19 years old.

Lindstrom's opportunity came tripping up to his doorstep on the afternoon of September 19. In the eighth inning of a game with the Cubs that day on the Polo grounds Heinie Groh, one of the game's great third sackers,

went charging into second in a desperate attempt to stretch what should have been a single. In the slide at the keynote owner Groh's right knee, a knee that had been heard from many times in the past, went to smash and in that twinkling of an eye Groh's 1924 season was at its close. That was Lindstrom's opportunity.

In the world's series he played phenomenally at third base, but fate tricked him in the final game by sending two balls hopping over his head. It was no fault of his, however. It was his fielding that caused him to be raised among those who made their marks, but his hitting was by no means a negligible quantity. He was up 30 times and hit safely in 16 for an average of .333.

His greatest feat was the colting of four hits in five attempts against Walter Johnson in the fifth battle of the series.

And, after all, he's still a kid who's glad to meet you and talk baseball with you.

AUTOS BARRED AT INDIANA SCHOOL

Bloomington, Ind., Oct. 15.—Students at Indiana university were in a furore today, due to an edict by Agnes E. Wells, dean of women, that co-eds would not be permitted to motor outside the city of Bloomington and denying them the privilege of possessing an automobile while attending the university, except during the two weeks at the opening and closing of the school year.

The ban on automobiles was placed, it was said, because of poor scholastic standing. Dean Wells said that the 50 per cent of the co-eds who were forced to leave school because of low grades, were known to have spent much time in automobiles.

The university faculty is said to be considering a rule to prohibit possession of an automobile by any student attending the university.
