Owing to deaths in both immediate families, the wedding, which will be solemnized on October 30, will be a quiet affair.

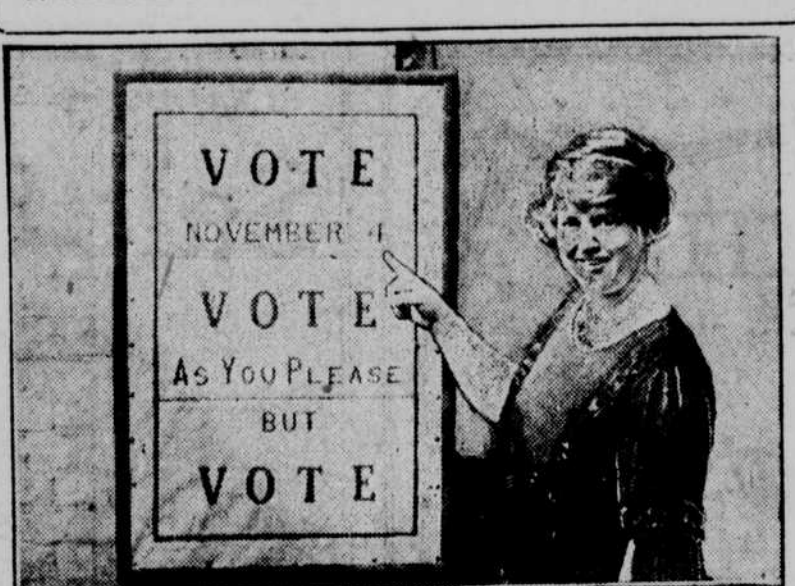
Lewis-Hickok.

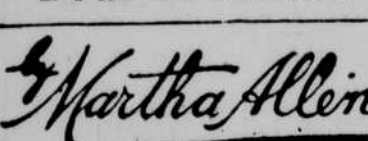
"I'm so glad you don't need to," I said, "but I want you to do something for me. Keep out of your mother's way until I have a chance to talk to her."
