Stiff Sentence Is Awarded for Theft of \$52

Court Scores Prisoner, 22. for Inducing Youth, 19, to Commit Crime.

"Judge, I have had quite a shock and if I ever get out of this, I am going to live an upright life and be a useful citizen," said Thomas Flinn when brought before Judge J. M. Fitzgerald Saturday morning.

"The sentence will be 15 years at hard labor," the court announced. Flinn was tried on a charge of robbery in connection with the theft of \$52 from the Union Bus station, 114 South Seventeenth street, on August The jury returned a verdict of guilty within 10 minutes after leaving courtroom.

"I have more consideration for a holdup man who goes out with a gun himself and takes a chance." said the court to Flinn, "than I have for you, who induced a youth to go inside and do the job while you remained outside."

Flinn was tried and sequitted a year and a half ago on charge of killing Sebastian Salerno when Flinn was working as an evidence man for federal prohibition officers. Flinn is 22 years old.






