

Haskell Indians and Creighton University to Play at League Park Today

Record Crowd of Season Will Attend Contest

Bluejays Enter Game to Square Defeat Suffered at Hands of Redskins Last Year.

The grid fans of this vicinity will have a rare dish of football set before them this afternoon at the Western league baseball park when the Omaha Creighton university, undefeated, opposes the nationally recognized Haskell Indians, an eleven of Lawrence, Kan. The game will start at 2 o'clock.

Both teams are in class A condition for the big fracas. Indians will not keep any of the stars from the game and with the announcement made last night by Coach Dick Hanley of the Redskins, that John Levi, all-American fullback, would work in today's game, fans will have an opportunity to see the kingpin of them all in action.

Coach Chet Wynne is not inclined to be pessimistic on the eve of the battle, and declared that "the boys are ready to battle Haskell to a standstill."

Athletic Director McDonald of Haskell expects the Bluejays to put up a great fight against his team. Thursday, in an address before an assembly of Creighton rooters, he declared that Haskell is looking for a world of opposition from the Blues.

With the return to the tackle position of Marcus Krasne, who has been out of the lineup with a dislocated shoulder, the Bluejay wall will be considerably strengthened and the average weight per man raised.

Creighton will outweigh the Indians about five pounds to a man today. The total weights of the elevens are: Creighton, 1,333; Haskell, 1,300.

Coach Hanley sent his men through a light signal workout yesterday on the Western league field. John Levi got in some punting and passing, while the entire team was given a general loosening up.

The Bluejays also had light work. Running signals and a dash of scrimmage against the frog, using Haskell players, wound up the final workout before the big game.

As today is homecoming day for Creighton university, a record-breaking crowd is expected. The reserved seats have been peddled out in blocs at the downtown ticket depot, but Athletic Director Schabinger announces that good seats may yet be obtained.

Coach Hanley gave a definite starting lineup, but Coach Wynne's selection is more or less tentative.

Princeton-Notre Dame Game One Feature of Saturday's Grid Slate

NEW YORK, Oct. 24.—Princeton and Dartmouth, meeting Notre Dame and Harvard in tomorrow's eastern gridiron battles, each has the memories of previous setbacks as incentives to victory.

While the Tigers have the sting of only one defeat—a crushing 25-2 reverse last year, —to goad them against the Hoosiers, Dartmouth has bitter recollections of an almost unprecedented series of disasters at the hands of Harvard.

Banking Harvard last season, 16 to 0, Dartmouth hung up its first triumph at Cambridge since 1907. The Crimson has triumphed in 25 out of 30 games these two decades have played since 1882.

Records of the Harvard-Dartmouth series show that the Green did not win a game until 1903, when the Hanoverians broke through by a score of 11 to 0.

Coach Rockne Very Modest Man

South Bend, Ind., Oct. 24.—Recite a little of Notre Dame's football history, throw the players a ball and presto. Another great gridiron legend is developed.

That is Athletic Director Knute Rockne's version of the way elevens from the local university are obtained.

Discussing Notre Dame football elevens in general just before his departure for Princeton, Rockne started 10 years ago, when he first started coaching, the team was enjoying great success and he used to throw out his chest and think he was quite a coach. "I have learned differently since," he continued. "I find that the best way to make the men play the game as Notre Dame men are expected to play it is to tell them of Notre Dame's achievements in the past. All myself or anyone else at Notre Dame needs to do to make a great team is to go out on the field, throw the men a ball and recite a little history."

Landis May and May Not Talk on Scandal Case

Commissioner Declares He Will Reveal Dolan Testimony Whenever He Thinks Best.

CHICAGO, Oct. 24.—Kenesaw M. Landis, baseball commissioner, said today the testimony of "Cozy" Dolan and Jimmy O'Connell, members of the New York Giants involved in the bribery scandal preliminary to the world series, would be revealed whenever, in his judgment, it would serve a useful purpose in clearing up the situation.

Commissioner Landis declined to say whether Dolan and O'Connell had been placed in the same class with the members of the Chicago White Sox, who were placed on the ineligible list for conspiracy to throw the world series of 1919 to Cincinnati.

Answering the question whether Dolan and O'Connell had been forever banished from organized baseball, the commissioner said they had been placed on the ineligible list. He refused to amplify this statement. His original statement, issued at the time of his action against the two players covered the situation, he said.

"Judge Landis does not intend to furnish ammunition to anybody interested in getting Dolan and O'Connell back into baseball," Leslie O'Connor, his secretary, said.

"If the time comes that Judge Landis considers the testimony of the two players will serve a useful purpose in clearing up the situation, it will be made public," O'Connor said.

"Of course, the commissioner will have to be satisfied that publication of the testimony would be in the public interest, and that it will serve some purpose."

Commissioner Landis had no comment to make on the threatened suit for damages for slander which William J. Fallon, attorney for Dolan, says he will file in New York federal courts soon. Dolan also will seek his share of the world series money and complete exoneration.

The Checkies intend to write the letters. Anyway, they have been scheduled for a game Sunday.

Luis Firpo Talks AT ROMERO BOUT

New York, Oct. 23.—Luis Firpo has belittled efforts of Tex Rickard to sign him for a match with Quintin Romero, the Chilean heavyweight, or George Godfrey, Philadelphia negro fighter.

The promoter wants to put on Firpo with either of these men at Madison Square Garden the first week of December, but so far the Argentine still involved in legal complications growing out of deprecation proceedings against him, has declined to sign articles.

Firpo indicated he still harbored resentment against Romero for the latter's alleged disparaging remarks last spring when Luis refused to meet the Chilean in South America. Firpo told Rickard's matchmaker he was disinclined to fight Romero on this account.

Five years ago, it is recalled, the Center eleven was probably more powerful but far less stylish. The last time they journeyed to a West Virginia game was from Charleston, W. Va., from Danville, Ky., in day coaches, arriving after midnight and getting little rest, although football history reveals that on the next afternoon they overpowered the potent mountaineer eleven and jumped to fame.
