Crippled Team Will Face Fast Missouri Squad

Chill Wind Aids Training of Gridsters in Their Final Workout

Lincoln, Oct. 30.—After a week of scrimmaging which has been anything but satisfactory, the Nebraska coaches resorted to a long drill on fundamentals Thursday before tossing the varsity and frosh into the stadium enclosure for what will be the last hard practice before the Missouri game Saturday.

Capt. Ed Wynn and Doug Myers have been unable to suit up for a practice this week on account of injuries. Other first stringers are carrying minor hurts which have caused Coach Dawson to take few chances with them in scrimmages.

Thursday evening found the backs under Coach Dawson sidestepping imaginary foes and polishing up the interference while the linemen were getting a dose of hand defensive work under the direction of Coach Schutte.

A chill wind sweeping the practice field kept dust in the players' faces most of the evening but the cooler weather tended to put more snap in them.

The Missouri Tigers, 30 strong, are due to arrive here early Friday morning. Gwynn Henry's eleven will take out the kinks with a workout at Stadium field in the afternoon.

Captain Weir expressed confidence that both he and Myers would be able to get in Saturday's game, although the Husker's great tackle and mainstay in the line admitted his leg was just as sore as ever.

HE long looked for high school football game between Omaha's two undefeated prep elevens, South and Tech, will be played tomorrow afternoon at Tech field before what is expected to be the largest crowd that has attended a high school grid contest here this year.

Both South and Tech are in the running for both the city and state championships. A defeat for either team will put that eleven out of both races.

According to scores of previous contests between these two teams, the game tomorrow will be the "rubber" contest. South and Tech started playing each other in 1915. With the exception of 1917, 1918 and 1919, war years, when no games were played, South has won three games and Tech the same number.

Chicago, Oct. 30.—Illinois, western conference leaders, encounters a team whose line is 15 pounds heavier to a man in its meeting with Iowa Saturday in the premier Big Ten contest of the week.

The Illini forwards, averaging 155 pounds are matched with combination averaging 200 with Griffin, Hawkeye center, the heaviest at 228. The heaviest of the Illini is Dick Hall, 210-pound tackle.

Stagg makes no attempt to evade the fact that his present outfit is not a typical Chicago team. It has all kinds of power between the two 20-yard lines but when the defense creeps up under its guns, power alone will not do.
