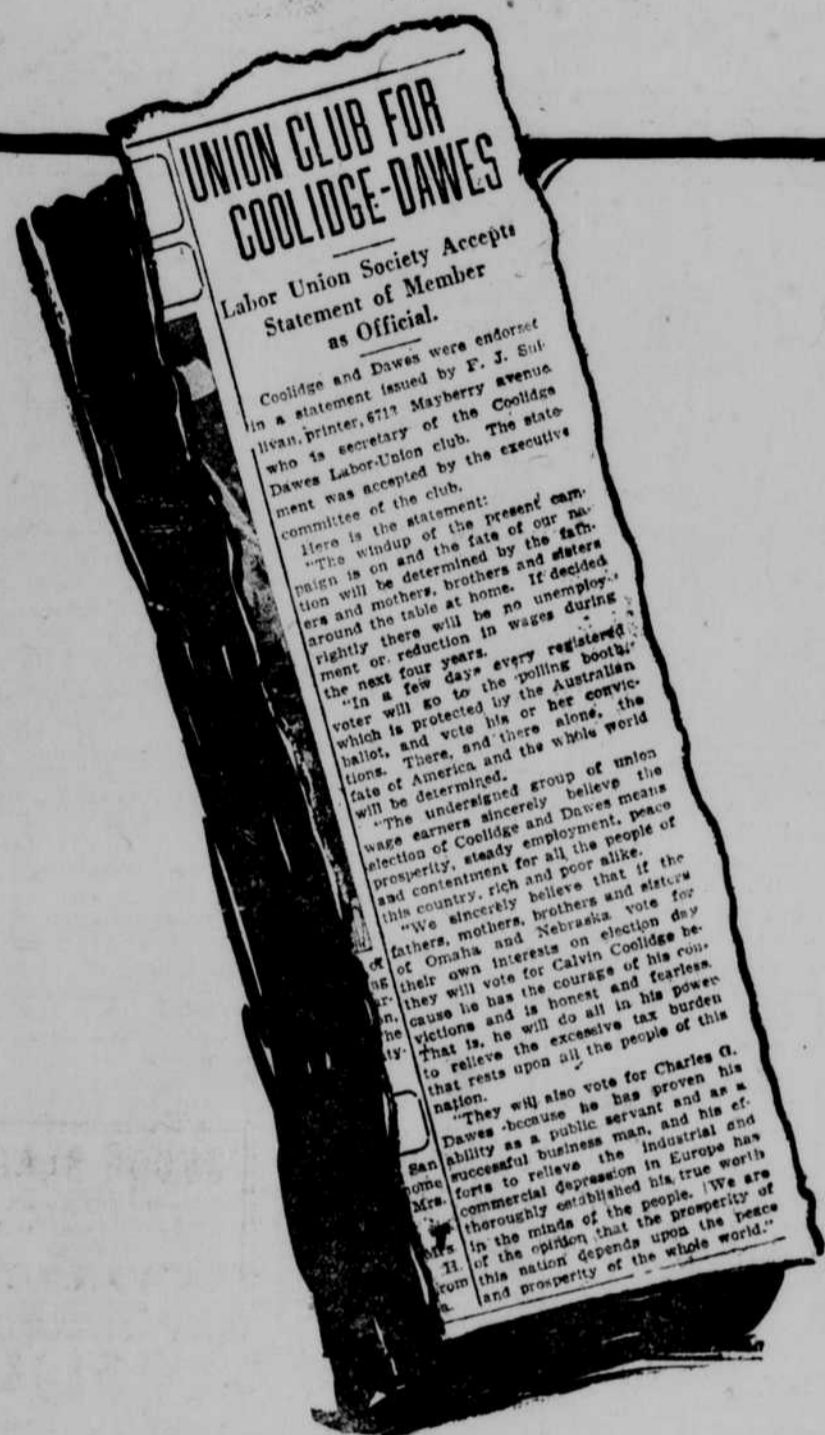


# Why We Endorse Coolidge and Dawes!
