

# Missionary Work Planned by Women

More Than 50 Presbyterian Churches Represented at Synodical Meeting.

The whole field of Presbyterian missions was studied and discussed and plans were laid for seeking assistance for missions during the coming year. The officers of the society are: President, Mrs. H. V. Hilliker, Omaha; First vice president and director of stewardship, Mrs. L. W. Hague, Minden; second vice president and director of freedmen work, Mrs. C. P. Fall, Beatrice; third vice president and editor of the Messenger, Mrs. D. H. Dunham, Omaha; financial secretary, Mrs. S. A. Sherrerd, Wood River; corresponding recording secretary, Mrs. W. H. Kearns, Omaha.

The meeting began Tuesday afternoon with registration of delegates and a complimentary dinner in the evening at the Presbyterian church. ### The Preserve Shelf.

#### Curry Sauce.

Three tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 1 teaspoon curry powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 cups stock from cooked lamb, 1/2 onion, sliced, and 1/2 cup seedless raisins.

Melt butter, add onions and fry until a golden brown, then remove from pan; add flour, curry powder and salt; mix until smooth, then add liquid; cook, stirring constantly until creamy; add raisins and pour over a border of cooked rice having cooked lamb in the center.

#### Spiced Peaches (in Quantity).

Remove the skins from seven quarts of peaches and have ready a syrup made from five pounds of sugar, one pint of vinegar, one cupful of water and two-thirds of a cup of broken stick cinnamon. Press into each peach three whole cloves and cook a few at a time in the spiced syrup, turning if necessary, so that they are cooked through and yet not broken. Drain out the peaches into sterilized jars, cook down the syrup and pour over the fruit, filling the jars to overflow. Seal as for canned fruit.

## Pears, Grapes and Melons Blend in Good Combinations

#### Pear and Melon Fruit Cup.

1 cantaloupe.  
2 Bartlett pears.  
1 cup diced watermelon.  
1/2 cup sugar.  
2 cloves.  
2 lemons.  
1 cup ginger ale.

Dice the fruit and add the sugar, lemon juice and cloves. Just cover with ginger ale and chill thoroughly. Garnish with berries if in season.

#### Pear and Grape Cocktail.

1-2 cups juice from Concord grapes.  
3 Bartlett pears.  
Sugar to taste.

Squeeze out the pulp from the grapes and put through a coarse sieve to remove the seeds. Dice the pears and add to the juice, sweetening as necessary. While chilling let some of the grape skins stand in the juice to get the flavor. Remove the skins and serve ice cold.

#### Grape and Melon Cup.

1 1/2 cups diced cantaloupe.  
1 1/2 cups seeded Tokay grapes.  
3/4 cup white grape juice.  
Few leaves mint.  
Sugar to taste.

Cut the grapes in half and combine with the other ingredients. Chill thoroughly, leaving the mint in just long enough to flavor intangibly. Serve with mint leaves as garnish.

#### Pears with French Custard.

6 pears.  
6 eggs.  
2 pints milk.  
1/2 cup sugar.  
1 teaspoon vanilla.  
3 tablespoons sugar for meringue.

Cook the halved and cored pears in sugar syrup until tender (equal parts of sugar and water for the syrup). Make a boiled custard of the milk, egg yolks and sugar. Make a meringue of the whites, sugar and vanilla and drop it with a tablespoon on a very lightly greased baking sheet and

bake in a slow oven, 300 degrees, until a delicate brown. Put the pears on a serving dish, cover with the custard and chill. When ready to serve slip the meringues with a flat knife from the baking sheet and place on top of the pears and custard.

#### Baked Pears.

Halve the pears, remove the cores and stems and place face downward in a baking dish. The peeling, if tender and not bitter, need not be removed. Sprinkle over with sugar and cinnamon, add some butter and water and bake uncovered at 355 degrees for 30 minutes, heating rather frequently. For three medium sized pears use:

- 1/3 cup brown sugar.
- 1/2 cup water.
- 1 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon.
- 1 tablespoon butter.

#### Baked Pears in Ginger Jelly.

Bake the pears in a sauce of brown sugar, cinnamon, butter and water and set aside to cool.

For the jelly dissolve one tablespoon of plain gelatin and one tablespoon sugar in one and a half cups of cold ginger ale and the juice of one

#### Fruit Cups.

To three cupfuls of any fruit mixture sweetened with syrup, add three-quarters of a cupful of round sweetened cranberries. Let chill a few hours before using. A suitable combination would be one cupful each, bits of orange, pineapple and apple, one cupful of the cranberries and a few halved and seeded Malaga or Tokay grapes and sugar syrup to blend.

For two quarts of popped corn melt four tablespoonfuls of butter. Im-

mediately after popping, while the corn is still warm, pour the butter over slowly and stir so as to distribute evenly. Salt to taste. Return to the heated oven for a few minutes.
