

Football Games Are Holding Center of Stage in Both East and West Today

Nebraska Clashes With Missouri in Game of Season

Eastern Teams All Prepared for Frays Which Open Final Month of Contests.

Kansas City, Mo., Oct. 31.—Tomorrow promises to be an epoch-making day for Missouri or Nebraska in the Missouri Valley conference football race. While eight conference teams are scheduled to swing into action, eclipsing all others in interest will be the annual clash between the undefeated Tigers of Old Miss and the Nebraska Cornhuskers at Lincoln.

Missouri rules a slight favorite because its goal line has been crossed but once this season. However, the Cornhuskers, always formidable foes, are conceding nothing and the game promises to be one of the outstanding Missouri Valley battles of the season.

Second in interest is the clash between Iowa State and the Kansas Aggies at Manhattan. Both teams hold decisions over the Kansas Jayhawkers and appear about evenly matched. The Aggies probably have the stronger defense.

Kansas lines up against Washington at St. Louis for the eighth time since athletic relations were established between the two schools. With the exception of one 6 to 6 tie, Kansas has always won from Washington and hopes to maintain this record. The two teams trail at the end in the conference standings, neither having won a conference game this season.

Oklahoma will invade Stillwater for a game with Oklahoma A. and M. and Grinnell meets Coe college at Cedar Rapids, Ia. Drake is not scheduled.

While Yale is battling with one of her strongest foes, the other members of the "Big Three" will sharpen their weapons on minor opposition in preparation for the battle against each other next Saturday. Harvard, beaten a week ago by Dartmouth, has a comparatively easy foe in Boston university, while Princeton, recovering from its trouncing at the hands of Notre Dame, will attempt to build a new offensive against Swarthmore.

Rivaling the Yale-Army game in general interest will be the clash between two undefeated eleven when Lafayette opposes Pennsylvania at Philadelphia and the annual tussle between Cornell and Columbia at Ithaca.

Lafayette, with one of the most rugged outfits in the east, will be favored to down Pennsylvania, which will enter the fray minus Kreuz, one of the season's high scoring stars.

Syracuse, the third and only other outstanding team undefeated or untied in the east, will be favored to keep her slate clean against Pittsburgh. Penn State, though defeated in the last two months activities, has been matched with the Navy which, on top of three successive setbacks, has lost several stars for scholastic reasons.

Dartmouth's powerful array has the call on Brown, but the scrappy Rhode Islanders showed they are dangerous by the stand they made against Yale a week ago.

The east will attempt to retrieve some of its lost intersectional honors when Washington and Jefferson invade the middle west for a game with Detroit university while the Haskell Indians, from Kansas, come east to oppose Boston college.
