An example of how the foreigner who during the war was termed a 'slacker' may expect to be treated when applying for citizenship now, when all signs of war have been dissipated, was shown in federal court in this city.

Four foreigners, whose draft pa pers classed them as unwilling to serve in the army, were told by Judge Albert S. Reeves that the court was unwilling to give them naturalization papers.

"You refused to accept the United States as your country when you were needed," Judge Reeves told each of the four, "It is difficult for the court to make allowance for you No explanation was attempted by

any of the four. Abashed, none of the four made any protest. One of them braced himself long enough to ask if it would ever be possible that he could become a naturalized citizen. The judge replied that this was question the federal authorities a

Washington must answer. Not all foreigners who have been in this country since the days before the war are constructed of this mettle. Many have won their rights to full citizenship mainly by showing

their army serivice records, Charles MacKay, a Scotchman, was one of this class, whose case was called before the court soon after the "unwilling" foreigners were de nied citizenship papers. MacKay enlisted in the army in 1917 and, when asked his residence for the past five years, merely presented his army rec
