

Huge Radio Show Will Open Here on November 10

Exhibition at Auditorium to Depict Development of Wireless From Earliest Stage.

Omaha, who are interested in radio, will have an opportunity to learn more of this art at the radio show, which will open at the Auditorium, November 10.

The Radio Corporation of America, cooperating with its distributors in this section, the McGraw Electric company, the Mid-West Electric company, the R. C. A. dealers, and the Brunswick dealers, have arranged a huge radio educational exposition, which gives a clear picture of the development of radio.

The underlying theme of the show is to teach everyone what radio was like in its pioneer days, how it has developed, and the multiplicity of uses which it has in modern life.

The apparatus comprising the exhibit, particularly the "ancient" devices, has been gathered from the storerooms of the navy, the army and the Radio Corporation of America and from the laboratories of independent inventors.

Another section shows the uses of radio in marine work. This, the first application of radio, also is its most important one, for here it not only is useful for social and commercial intercourse, but also is an absolute necessity for the saving of lives.

The radio show is under the direction of G. H. Clark, manager of the exhibition division of the Radio Corporation of America. Mr. Clark has been a radio engineer since the first days of radio.

One section of the show is devoted to historical relics, particularly receiving apparatus. It is fascinating to see the curious designs of 25 years ago standing side by side with the newer developments of later years, which in turn are followed by the latest designs.

Uses of Marine Radio. Another section shows the uses of radio in marine work. This, the first application of radio, also is its most important one, for here it not only is useful for social and commercial intercourse, but also is an absolute necessity for the saving of lives.

The most interesting feature of the entire exhibit is the broadcasting station. This consists of a real studio with central panel, microphone and the usual piano and decorations and a radio transmitter with amplifier panel. The transmitter is capable of a range of several hundred miles and is licensed by the Department of Commerce under the call letters WEBL.

A broadcasting program has been arranged for each day of the show. Mr. Clarkson is the announcer as well as the lecturer, who explains the entire show. Mr. Mitchell and Mr. Reig are the radio engineers in the transmitting room.

Admission to the show is 25 cents. The show will leave the radio fan with a tolerance toward occasional interference and the beginner in radio with a preliminary education gained painlessly in an hour or so.

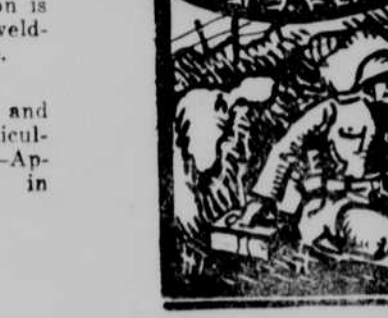
Marine Radio Exhibit—How messages are sent from ship to shore.



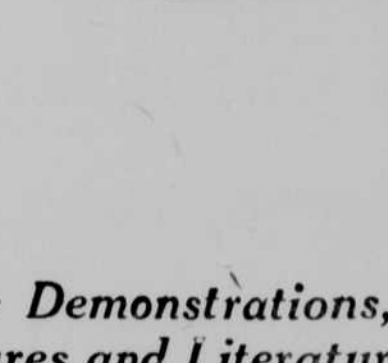

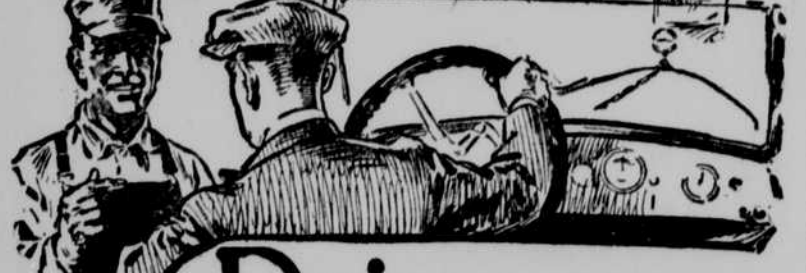
