Sad Tale This

Eugene O'Neill Again Finds Life Afloat or Ashore Not Worth Living, Dying Messy

New York, Nov. 8. HESE are troubled waters through which the "S. S. Glencairn" sails and no soothing oils are poured on them by the author, Eugene O'Neill. The "Glencairn," as you may know, is a British tramp, manned by a crew of interesting derelicts-Irish, Scotch, Yank, English, Russian and Scandinavian. Forlorn sinners all, they cruise such of the seven seas as happen to be convenient-boozing, fighting, 'usting and' dying. They are drunk and lecherous under the "Moon of the Caribbees:" they are hysterical with fear in the submarine zone; and they are drugged and shanghaied in a dive on the London water front.

All of which suggests Mr. O'Neill's belief that life on the ocean wave is not what it is cracked up to be. There is less Yo Ho! to it than there is bad whisky, bad women, bad food and bad habits. Mr. O'Neill desponds equally about existence affoat and ashore. The four short plays com prising his present entertainment at the Provincetown theater are dramateynical and photographic. Having discovered no cheerfulness either on the earth or in the waters under the earth, Mr. O'Neill might with profit investigate the clouds. But in case he does so, I suppose he will desre gard the joys of aviation and report only its miseries. . . All the sketches in the current bill are familiar to the Little theaters and the college dramatic societies, but this is the first time they have been presente ogether.

The air is hot with discussion about Miss Barrymore's Tanqueray. Some of those who keep vigil on the drama and its acting see her as too vulgar a lady with a past; others as not vulgar enough. Still others say that she is a perfect blending of both qualities v the smart, well-bred woman of the half world, and then the tarnished victim of its degrading influences. At heart a nice girl, they contend, poor Paula in proceeding from one rich lover to another was bound to meet some crude persons such as Lady Orreyd, ex-showgirl, and to be contaminated by their indecorums.

Mr. Pinero, in introducing us to Paula, kept her early history a secret. She may, for all that he has told us, have been a vicar's daughter, betrayed in an unwary moment by June and a faithless man. Or the offspring of an elegant adventurer who taught her manners but no morals. Or any of as many things as your imagination may devise. Perhaps was left on a doorstep when an infant, or stolen by gypsies at the age of 4.
