Wall Street's Walpurgis. Boom, Not Panic. A Real French Hero. By ARTHUR BRISBANE.

Wall street, following the election, has been indulging in a series of Walpurgis nights, only the exciting scenes occurred in broad daylight. On Thursday, with Coolidge's election sure, the stock boom started, and it has gone on increasing, day by day. Bulls that have taken their profits have had no effect on the rise. And they have, Job-like, "cursed their day" and themselves for selling.

Last Saturday 500,000 shares were sold in 30 minutes, a record for all time. Such selling would mean 5,000,000 shares in a regular five-hour session of the exchange. In Saturday's two-hour session before noon, 1,388,105 shares were dealt in. And the thing, apparently, is only starting.

Many, unfortunately, will wake up later with a bad financial headache, and many, buying beyond their power to digest, will have to begin all over again. That always happens, in stock booms or land booms. Only the really wise get rich, and stay-rich, at anything.

There is one pleasant feature of the extraordinary stock transactions. They are based on a boom, not on a panic. Hitherto such a market of violent dealings has never been seen except in time of great panic, with frightened owners throwing their stocks overboard, at any price.

The great rise and boom has been in railroad stocks. This writer, having advised readers on the day after election to buy railroad stocks, wisely, feels bound to advise the little man, most earnestly, that the quickest road to the poor house is stock trading on a margin.

If you can pay half, or even quarter now, and are absolutely certain of your ability to pay the rest later, go ahead. But gambling in stocks—or anything else—means certain ruin, not sometimes, but always.

All stock market records have been broken in this "Coolidge boom," and when the dust settles, a few will have more yachts; the majority will have more experience. It's all part of providential wisdom. The man with money gone must go to work at something more constructive than watching the ticker.

Government economies that are promised—Coolidge and Mellon will make good their promises—will cut down government expenses by \$500,000,000 more annually. That will help prosperity to boom, and it proves that the people made a good investment when they secured Mr. Mellon's services. He will get this country out of debt even without collection of our European billions, if his policy is followed out.

The Wahabis, now ruling Mecca, holy city of the Mohammedans, are to Islam what the Quakers or Puritans were to Christianity. You can't be too pure to suit a Wahabi, and he hates smoking, says it's ungodly.

Therefore, no more smoking in the holy city, and as for drinking alcoholic fluids, that's unthinkable. One hundred thousand narghiles, Turkish pipes with long tubes, have been seized and solemnly burned by the Wahabis. Childish, you may say, but not as bad as burning human beings, or the noblest forms of antiquity because they fail to share your religious views. Christians have done that on a scale that Wahabism never dreamed of.

Everybody knows that in courage, the French are excelled by no race on earth. The Gauls, telling Alexander that they feared nothing except that the heavens might fall on them, proud, Verginotrix dragged behind Caesar's chariot, the noble D'Assis "dead on the field of honor," Crillon and Duguesclin, their bodies covered with scars—in front—the Frenchman that held onto the enemy's boat with his elbows, after both his hands had been cut off—they all live in glory.

Science produces a new and greater French hero, Dr. Bergonie of Bordeaux, who has just died, killed by his constant use of radium in his warfare against cancer. Weakened by radium bombardment, to which he was constantly subjected, his tissues were attacked by the cancer that he sought to conquer. His right arm was cut off and then three fingers of his left hand. He continued at his work to the day of his death, experimenting with and lecturing on the effects of radium on the gangrene that attacked one of his remaining fingers.

To his last day he worked, enabled to endure the horrible agony by morphine administered by his associates, never complaining, but saying toward the end, "three or four days more and I shall be delivered."

That's real courage, quiet heroism without the excitement of the battlefield, or crowds applauding, fighting the battle of science against cancer, enemy of the entire race.

Custer Election Results Mixed

County Conceded to La Follette Gives Majorities for Coolidge and Norton.

Broken Bow, Nov. 10.—The election brought many surprises in Custer county. The county had been conceded to La Follette, but the official count showed a plurality of over 600 for Coolidge and Dawes. It gave Norton 700 over McMullen for governor.

United States Senator George W. Norris led his opponent, J. J. Thomas, by nearly 4,000. Williams, for lieutenant governor, won over the democratic candidate by over 400, while Charles Pool, for secretary of state on the democratic side, got more than 1,200 majority. C. W. Beal, democrat, for congress, lost his home county to Simmons by about 500. E. R. Purcell, candidate for state senator from the Twenty-third district, received all the votes of every party. S. C. Waldron, republican, for representative from the Eightieth district, and J. A. Dietz, democrat, from the Seventy-ninth, each had large majorities.

For the county offices H. F. Hanson, present incumbent, republican, won over the democratic candidate, Miss Estle Holcomb, by a small majority. J. W. Yockey, republican, was elected assessor. In the district judgeship race E. O. Hostetler of Kearney was winner. Two democratic and one republican supervisors were elected.

The proposal to pay a bounty on wild animal scalps was lost. The party designation and party circle carried by 216 majority.

Jefferson Vote Doubled. Fairbury, Nov. 10.—A summary of the official ballot of Jefferson county shows that 5,800 votes were cast, 3,900 more than at the election two years ago. It is estimated that one-third of the votes were registered by women, a much larger per cent than two years ago.

Coolidge led Davis by nearly 1,000 and La Follette by over 1,500. McMullen's lead over Norton was nearly 600; Spillman led the state ticket with 1,500; Robinson followed with a majority of more than 1,400; C. J. Watson of Fairmont defeated Charles Smrha in the Seventeenth senatorial district by 300 votes; Wells, democrat, for re-election in Thirtieth representative district, won over Jones, republican, by nearly 700. Wells was the only democrat in line after the republican sweep.
