Mrs. Head Home

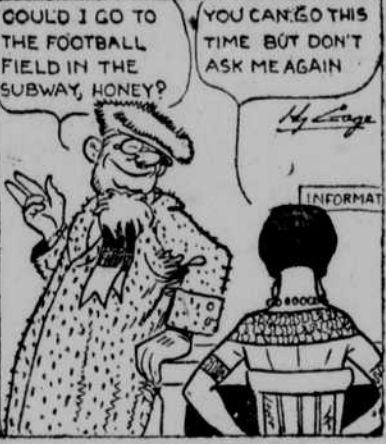

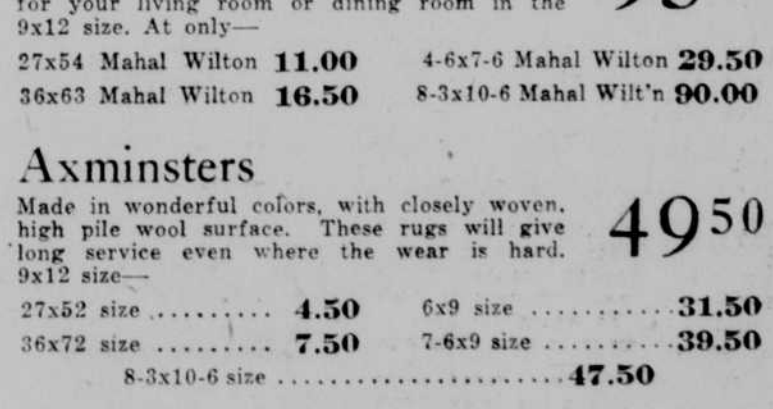
