

Wake, by defeating Kansas Aggies, Retains Clean State in Conference Race

One Game Stands Between Iowans and Championship

Bulldogs Meet Cyclones in Final Conference Contest Next Saturday—Pikers Fail to Win Single Game.

Kansas City, Mo., Nov. 16.—One more step—victory over Iowa State next Saturday—stands between Drake university and an undisputed claim to the Missouri Valley conference football championship.

The Des Moines eleven by its close victory over the Kansas Aggies Saturday remains the only undefeated team in the valley and will close the conference season this week. Drake's final game is with Florida university on Thanksgiving day.

Although the record shows the Kansas Wildcats outplayed the conference leaders in every department, the same went to the Bulldogs, 7 to 0. Aggie followers hold that Drake won a "technical" victory since a disputed play gave the Bulldogs their only touchdown.

Drake punted 40 yards from the Bulldog 20-yard line, and Anderson, Aggie quarterback and safety man, was waiting to receive the ball on the hop. It took a freakish rebound, however, to Anderson's right.

Lingenfelter, charging down to tackle Anderson, picked up the oval and dashed 25 yards to the touchdown.

Clarence Schutze, the northern men's driving halfback, who was chiefly responsible for the most startling performance of the season, moved from 24th to fifth place in the standing, the greatest change in the list of leading point winners.

Rockwell of Michigan, who was runner up last week, advanced to within one point of Grange, making a touchdown, field goal, and point after touchdown. Ralph Beyer of Northwestern, who was giving Grange such a close race earlier in the season for leadership, failed to improve his point total.

Grid Honors in East Claimed by Numerous Teams

No Fewer than Five Elevens Put Forth Claims to Title; Pennsylvania's Record Best.

NEW YORK, Nov. 16.—With the end of the 1924 eastern football season only two weeks off, the contest for premier sectional honors remains an "open race."

Where a year ago the battle had narrowed down to two outstanding elevens, Yale and Cornell, the stretch this year finds no fewer than five teams putting forth title claims.

Saturday's results, adding further fuel to the blaze of upsets that has marked the season's path so far, produced outstanding features in the decisive victory of Yale over Princeton, blasting the Tigers' hopes of a "Big Three" championship while strengthening the Blue's chances, and the scoreless tie struggle between Pennsylvania and Penn State, which topped the Quakers from their lofty perch as the only eleven neither beaten nor tied.

Penn's record of eight victories, one tie and no defeats still keeps her to the front in the title scramble, but the Red and Blue now must share the heights with Dartmouth and Rutgers, each of which also has only one tie to mar its record. The big Green outfit, held to even terms only by Yale, closed its season with a smashing 27 to 14 triumph over Cornell at the Polo Grounds and with other victories over Harvard and Brown to its credit must be considered when final honors are distributed.

Rutgers, tied only by Lehigh, added another impressive victory to her list by trouncing New York university, while Yale and Lehigh complete the list of prominent unbeaten aggregations. Of the two the Eli's have the stronger title claims, with ties against Dartmouth and the Army as the only breaks in a victorious record, while the Bethlehem collegians have been held to even terms by Rutgers, Princeton and Holy Cross and managed to beat Villanova yesterday by only one touchdown.

Among other outstanding events Saturday, Williams captured the "Little Three" title for the fourth successive year by trouncing Amherst while Columbia caused a surprise and earned at least a "moral victory" by holding the strong Army eleven to a 14 tie at West Point. West Virginia encountered an unexpected tartar in Washington and Lee, winning by a touchdown only in the last few minutes while Washington and Jefferson downed Pittsburgh in another battle of traditional foes. Bucknell surprised by conquering the Navy, 6 to 0, although the middles, losing many regulars, through scholastic deficiencies, have been weakened by a struggle to reorganize.

East and middle-west divided honors in two inter-sectional engagements. Bo McMillan's Centenary college eleven upsetting the strong Boston college team, 10 to 9, while the natic Marines trounced Detroit university on the latter's gridiron.

Berkeley, Cal., Nov. 15.—William T. Tilden, II, of Philadelphia, national tennis champion, defeated Ray Case of San Francisco, California state, Pacific coast and Pacific Northwest champion, in the first of the all-star matches here today. The score was 6-3, 6-2. Two other singles and two doubles were played, with California defeating the other teams.

Helen Jacobs, national junior champion, defeated Ed Woodall, 7-5. Gerald Stratford won from Helen Willis, national and Olympic champion, 7-5. Miss Jacobs and Tilden defeated Miss Willis and Vincent Richards, Olympic champion, who held the national mixed doubles title, 6-4.
