Covered Button.

Wash dresses, aprons and blouses may be made very attractive by the use of covered buttons. On plain colored gingham, checked gingham buttons give a unique touch. They should, of course, harmonize with the color of the frock. A plain blue gown needs buttons covered with blue and white checked gingham, while a checked brown and white dress or apron is charming with plain brown or white buttons. Instead of molds, men's trouser buttons may be utilized, the under or oval side being used for the top. After covering they are sewed onto the garment, ciscross through the holes, contrasting or harmonizing thread being used as an added decorative feature. This fastens the button securely and there is no danger of breaking this metal foundation in laundering.
