

School "Kiddies" Hear Symphony

Special Concert for Youngsters Given Hearty Applause by Tiny Hands.

The hands of 4,200 school children of Omaha were so eager to applaud the Omaha Symphony orchestra in a special concert for their benefit Friday morning at the Auditorium that in one instance Conductor Englebert Roentgen told them "now then, clap," after they had clapped before the end of a selection.

Children of all ages in the Omaha schools listened attentively through the entire concert. North High school had a representation of 300 there, Dundee school had 290, and Columbian school had 265. Miss Juliette McCune, supervisor of music in the schools, had distributed season tickets to the children at a small fee.

A concert will be given for the children after each concert of the orchestra this season. "We want to expose children to good music," said Miss McCune, "and what the children have heard will be used in the music appreciation work."

In the audience were Mrs. Roentgen and Miss Florence Van Hoven, soprano soloist of the concert Thursday evening.

JEWEL ROBBER GETS 20 YEARS

New York, Nov. 21.—Harry Behan, convicted of having robbed Mrs. Howard Johnson of \$4,000 worth of gems in the Hotel Almac last May, was sentenced to 20 years imprisonment in Sing Sing prison by Judge Collins today.

After sentence had been pronounced, Assistant District Attorney Garrison announced he had received information that Behan had been in the company of Miss Louise Lawson six hours before she was strangled to death in her fashionable apartment last winter. The police had not succeeded in connecting Behan with the slaying, Garrison said, and the Lawson murder mystery remains unsolved.

As he was being led from the courtroom, Behan's bride of 19 months, the former Lillian Schultz of San Francisco, tried to rush into his arms.

"It's a long time, Harry," she called to him, "but love is longer."

Mrs. Behan is awaiting trial as her husband's accomplice.

The Behans were guests of Mrs. Johnson the night of the robbery.

Mammoth Transcontinental Busses Stop in Omaha; Just Like Being in Hotel Suite, Says Woman Passenger

Bi-Weekly Service of New Motorized "Covered Wagon" Planned.

Covered wagon days are being revived in de luxe style by the Motorway Tourist company of New York and Los Angeles.

Two of the company's "covered wagons" rolled into Omaha Thursday night from New York, and resumed their jaunt towards Los Angeles Friday morning.

The "wagons" aren't what they used to be. No indeed. They're electric lighted, they're upholstered in subdued, soothing shades of plush, they're bump proof with balloon tires that stretched out would resemble small dirigibles, and instead of oxen or mules they boast the very latest and slickest thing in gasoline motors.

Trail Blazing Trip. Four of the "wagons" left New York a week or so ago on a trail blazing transcontinental trip, with some 30 passengers aboard. Each passenger had to pay the company \$410 to make the trip, which is expected to take 30 days.

It will require 600 gallons of gasoline to take each "wagon" from coast to coast, an estimated distance of 3,600 miles, according to Royal R. Sibley, president of the company.

Mrs. Cora Chapman—address Hotel McAlpin, New York—is one of those making the trip. Mrs. Chapman is quite elated over her experience so far.

Just Like Hotel. "Just like being in my hotel suite," said Mrs. Chapman, "only more interesting. Yes, we call our busses wagons, to keep up the illusion. We enjoy thinking how tough it must have been for the old-timers—not because we aren't sorry for them, but because it makes us enjoy our trip all the more."

Whereupon Mrs. Chapman of Hotel McAlpin jumped upon the fenders of one of the "wagons" and smiled sweetly as a picture was taken.

There are really some "old-timers" on the trip, too. Several gray-haired women are among the trail blazers. It was whispered about that they were the wives of millionaires.

Third Is Waiting. The two "wagons" pulled out for Lincoln at 11, where a third is awaiting them. The fourth bus is still in Chicago. They will go to Colorado Springs, then pick up the Santa Fe trail, and continue the trip through New Mexico and Arizona.

The busses will be used for a 12-day California tour for a time. Next year the Motorway company expects to establish regular bi-weekly service to and fro across the continent. The price on these trips, from New York to Los Angeles, will be \$465, including all meals and rooms in the best hotels at night, company officials said.

Ship Withstands Heavy Battering

New Dreadnaught, Washington, Would Have Been Invincible, Navy Men Say.

Norfolk, Va., Nov. 21.—"With all its equipment of defense and offense, it would have been invincible," navy men declared today as operations against the unfinished hull of the superdreadnaught Washington, last of the capital ships to be destroyed under the arms agreement, were resumed 35 miles east of Cape Henry today.

Despite the assaults launched against its very vitals, the Washington was uninjured. So superior is its armor plate that direct shots from the 14-inch rifles of the battleship Texas only dented it. Today's bombardment of the helpless hull of the Washington will be of tremendous proportions. No less than 30,000 pounds of explosives from planes alone will be dropped on her, and the Texas will try to finish the job with shell fire if it is still afloat after this rain of death.

RAID UNCOVERS NARCOTIC RING

Stuebenville, O., Nov. 21.—Federal agents, completing today one of the most sensational drug raids in the history of this section, declared they had uncovered one of the biggest "dope rings" between New York and Chicago.

Ten federal agents made 20 arrests and confiscated thousands of dollars' worth of morphine, cocaine, heroin and other drugs. Many of those arrested are women.

French Loan Arranged. Paris, Nov. 21.—Finance Minister Clementel has arranged with the Morgan interests for a loan to France of \$100,000,000 at 7 per cent.

GRANGE OPPOSES NEW AMENDMENT

Atlantic City, N. J., Nov. 21.—By an overwhelming vote, the National Grange today put itself squarely on record against the child labor amendment to the federal constitution. The organization pledged its most vigorous efforts to prevent ratification of the amendment.

This decision was reached after a long discussion and was supported by the votes of every state in the body except Washington, Oregon and Missouri. The convention will meet next year at Sacramento, Cal.

Bradish Business District Burned

Three Buildings and Two Stocks of Merchandise Destroyed.

Special Dispatch to The Omaha Bee. Albion, Nov. 21.—Fire wiped out today the main part of the business section of the village of Bradish, six miles east of here. Three buildings and two stocks of general merchandise were destroyed. The buildings belonged to Ben Stangland, Harry Mathews and John Garvey. There is left but one store in the village.

It is not known how the fire originated. The wind was blowing a gale and the fire spread so rapidly that practically nothing was saved. The wind carried sparks for a quarter of a mile and set fire to some hay stacks in an adjoining field. The Albion fire department was called for and arrived in time to prevent the spread of the fire. The total loss is upwards of \$10,000 with insurance of \$4,000.
