LONGWORTH FOR CURBING RADICALS

Washington, Nov. 22.—Representative Longworth of Ohio, republican house leader, came out today in favor of restricting the consideration heretofore given the insurgent republicans in the house.

Those insurgents who failed to support President Coolidge, Mr. Longworth said, had no reason for undue consideration in the organization of the next house.

The Ohio representative who called upon President Coolidge, contended, as have several other republican members of the house or senate, that inasmuch as the republicans will be held responsible for legislation the party should take such steps in the organization of the next house to prevent hindrance from the insurgent group. He did not outline, however, any specific plan for taking care of the La Follette supporters in the way of committee assignments.

Plymouth, Vt., Nov. 22.—This village, birthplace of President Coolidge, today honored the memory of Capt. John Coolidge, soldier of the revolution and great-great-grandfather of the president. A flagpole, the gift of the Massachusetts society, Sons of the Revolution, was dedicated at the bid village school house in memory of the revolutionary warrior who fought at Bunker Hill.

The flagpole has been placed near the present school house which occuples the site of the school in which President Coolidge received his early education.

Later the flag will be raised by Col. John Coolidge, the president's father.

3,000 GALLONS OF -ALCOHOL MOVED

Sheriff P. A. Lainson and a force of deputies moved 3,000 gallons of pure alcohol from a box car in the Wabash railroad yards Saturday morning to a strong room in the county jail.


