

# FAILURE TO AGREE ON PURCHASE PRICE HELD UP SALE OF COAST LEAGUE BALL TEAM LAST WEEK

### Senators Reported to Have Offered Great Pitcher Salary of \$30,000 a Year to Return to World's Champions.

AKLAND, CAL., Nov. 25.—Possibility that Walter Johnson, famous pitcher of the Washington Senators, may rejoin his team at a salary reported around the \$30,000 mark were some of the items discussed yesterday when Johnson's business partner, George Weiss, admitted that negotiations for the purchase of the Oakland club franchise may again be reopened.

Johnson and several of his teammates, including Joe Engle, scout of the Senators, were on a bear hunt in Nevada yesterday. Johnson had not returned to his home in Reno at a late hour last night.

Weiss said that he would leave for Reno this morning to confer with Johnson regarding certain important matters.

The possibility that Johnson and Weiss will reopen negotiations with J. Cal Ewing for the purchase of

the Oakland club will depend entirely on his conference with Johnson, Weiss said.

When Johnson and Weiss failed to exercise their option by the initial payment of \$25,000 on Saturday last, it was believed the deal was definitely ended.

In an interview with Universal Service Weiss said: "Money had nothing to do with our failure to exercise our option rights for the purchase of the Oakland club.

"We would have closed the deal had the price appeared to be all right."

Weiss refused to say he and Johnson failed to go through with the deal.

When asked if any of the stockholders of the Oakland club sought to retain their stock under the new ownership Weiss said that he thought it best not to discuss that phase of it.

"I am going to Reno," said Weiss, "and talk the matter over with Walter. There is a possibility that we may again start negotiations for the purchase of the Oakland club. I can't say any more at this time."

# Take First Step to Organize "Y" Commercial Basket Ball League

The first step toward formulating the 1924 Y. M. C. A. basketball league was taken last night when managers of Commercial league teams met with Physical Director Keester to draw up plans for the season.

Five teams, the Omaha Building and Commerce Clubs, the Council Bluffs, the Thorpean Athletic Club, and the Junior Chamber of Commerce made application for membership in the league.

The league will be made into either a six-team or an eight-team league and any team of class A material wishing to enter has until 9:30 o'clock Saturday night to do so.

Managers and backers of the Commercial league were unanimous in their opinion that the league should be made faster than last year, and players in this season's circuit will be enrolled from the cream of Omaha and Council Bluffs basketball ranks.

Of the five teams which have applied for admittance only two represent teams which have played in organized basketball at the "Y." The Commerce Clubs and Thorpean Athletic club, 1923 Commercial league champs, are old standbys, while the other three are newcomers.

New York, Nov. 25.—It became known today that John H. Heydler would be re-elected president of the National League for a five-year term at a handsome increase in salary. A few days ago there was a rumor that he would likely have some opposition when he runs for re-election at the league club owners' annual meeting here December 9. The Giants and Pirates owners, it was claimed, would put up another candidate. Charles Stoneham, president of the Giants, was somewhat peeved at Heydler for not informing him of the Dolan-O'Connell baseball scandal before going to Judge Landis.

# HAYNES TO RIDE FOR WERTHEIMER

New York, Nov. 25.—Everett Haynes, American jockey, who rode Pierre Wertheimer's French thoroughbred, Eplnard, in the three international specials in this country, has signed to ride for Wertheimer on the French turf for 1925, he disclosed today upon arriving on the Majestic to visit relatives here and in Oklahoma City.

The re-engagement of Haynes was viewed among turfmen as interesting in view of the criticism leveled at the jockey for his handling of Eplnard, particularly in the second special at Aqueduct, when Ladkin won from the invader by a nose.

Haynes disclosed that one of the handicaps Eplnard encountered was that he was forced to race to the left in making turns in accordance with American track customs. Eplnard, Haynes said, had done this only once before coming here.
