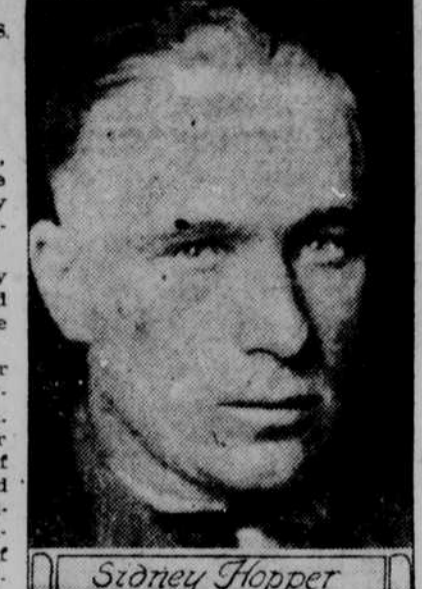
Nebraska Club Members Take Many Prizes at Chicago Exhibit.
