Executive Council Must Elect Successor to Serve Until Convention Next

Washington, Dec. 13 .- One of the stiffest and perhaps the bitterest, in ternal fights in history faced the American Federation of Labor today in selecting a successor to Samue

Under the constitution of the fed eration, Frank Morrison, secretary, utomatically succeeded to the presidency, but he must call a meeting of the executive council within six days to select a successor who shall serve until the next convention, to be held in Atlantic City, next fall. The council must meet as soon a

possible after Morrison's call. Compers had been president of the American Federation of Labor almos continuously since its founding. Of late years, his power was so great that no serious attempts were ever made to oust him. The last fight on him for the presidency was at the Denver convention of the federation four years ago.
