This is an old adage, but it is not true, nor will it be true unless the people of the world make it so.

America has urged a world court throughout all its history; a court where international law should take the place of war. There is now such a court, ready for our participation. Fifty-two nations, big and little nations, now subscribe to the court. Fifteen nations are on the outside. America is one of them.

The foundations of the World Court were laid by Elihu Root. President Harding urged that America participate. Charles Evans Hughes urges that America participate. President Coolidge urges that

America participate. President Harding and Secretary Hughes worked out the basis for our participation. Only matters that can be settled by international law will be referred to it. America cannot be compelled to submit any questions to the World Court--we must first agree to such submissions in each case as it may arise.

The subject of the World Court will be discussed at a meeting in the chambers of the Omaha City Council, Friday Evening, January 16th, at 8 o'clock.
