

Howard Jones Appointed Grid Coach of University of Southern California

Former Iowa Mentor to Assume Duties in Spring

Brother of Yale Coach Fills Place Left Vacant by Elmer Henderson, Resigned.

Los Angeles, Cal., Feb. 3.—Howard J. Jones, famous Iowa coach, brother of Tad Jones, Yale coach, today was appointed football coach of the University of Southern California to succeed Elmer C. Henderson, who resigned last month.

Jones was at a luncheon of the University of Southern California athletic officials when the announcement was made and indicated his acceptance. He will assume his position here in time to take over the spring practice.

He developed two championship teams for Iowa in 1921 and 1922 and spent last year at Trinity college, Durham, N. C.

RENAULT, RUTH ENTER GOLF MEET

Hot Springs, Ark., Feb. 2.—With golf at the end of the rainbow for the professionals and silver for the amateurs, more than 100 golfers are warmed up and ready for the opening of the south central open tournament here tomorrow.

"Doc" Proulx May Be Elected President—Plan to Play Four Evenings Each Week.

RELIMINARY plans for the organization of an eight-team twilight baseball league to be made up entirely of mail service employees were completed at a meeting of the managers of teams held last night at the postoffice. The loop will play four evenings each week. Final plans for the operation of the loop will be settled in two weeks when another meeting of the league will be held at which time a president and a board of directors will be elected. Lawrence (Doc) Proulx, who has been active in all of the postoffice employees' activities, will probably be elected president of the loop. At the present time Mr. Proulx is confined to the Nicholas Senn hospital. All branches of the mail service in Omaha as well as those at the terminal in Council Bluffs will be represented in the new league. A valuable trophy will be awarded the winners by Postmaster Black. At their next meeting the managers of the teams will decide whether or not the league will be affiliated with the Municipal Baseball association.

Old-Time Baseball Stars Holding Their Own With Younger Stars

A fitting perusal of baseball statistics reveals that many old-timers are holding their own with younger stars, if not excelling them. True, some of them are in the minors, but they are all up there swinging the old hickory with the well known vim and vigor. A striking example is Sherwood Magee, who as a Philly outfielder, way back in Bill Taft's administration, spent many a long afternoon chasing long hits to the fences. Last season in the American association Magee compiled the startling average of .315 in 83 games. Hats off to Grandpa.

Beals Becker and Otto Miller, former National leaguers, also batted over .300 in the association last year. Miller was a "kid" who broke in with Brooklyn when Magee and Baker were veterans. The most valuable collection of antiques in the American league next season will be owned by Washington. Stan Coveleskie, Dutch Reuther, Veau Gregg and Walter Johnson, if he returns to the fold, will comprise a pitching staff resembling a G. A. R. chapter. And, like fiddlers, they all seem to improve with age. Success to Washington's Four Horsemen will prove the versatility of Manager Harris. He won one pennant with a staff of pitchers composed of kids and now he's going to win another with a gang of hurlers almost old enough to be their daddies.

Fuente Acquitted of Conspiracy to Violate California Anti-Boxing Law

OS ANGELES, Feb. 3.—Tony Fuente, Mexican heavy-weight, was given a clean bill of health by a jury here today, when it acquitted him in his trial for conspiracy to violate the former state anti-prize fight law in his near-bout with Fred Fulton of Minneapolis at Culver City last summer. Fred Winsor, manager for Fuente; Fulton, and the latter's manager, Jack Reddy, all of whom were similarly charged, failed to stay to the finish. Winsor reversed his plea today and admitted his guilt, for which he paid \$750 as a fine. Fulton took the same course a few days ago and paid \$500. Reddy yesterday turned state's evidence and was released. Tony started the trial with a plea for a separate hearing, which was denied, but as the others dropped by the wayside he obtained the wish and finished alone. He took the stand in his own defense and declared that all he expected to get out of the Culver City affair was a medal. Incidentally, he added, he did not get the medal. Prior to this G. H. Freytag, a fight follower, had told of a conversation with Fulton before the fight in which he said the Minneapolis man had admitted he was to get \$6,000 to "lay down." The bout that caused all the trouble lasted just 35 seconds before Fulton was counted out. The crowd vociferously branded it as a fake. Philadelphia—Carl Tremaine, Cleveland bantam-weight, was awarded the judges' decision over Joe Nelson, Philadelphia, at the end of 10 rounds.

'TIGER' FLOWERS DEFEATS MOORE

Newark, N. J., Feb. 2.—Tiger Flowers had all the best of Ted Moore, the British boxer, in 12 rounds of the milling here tonight, in which the Atlanta negro was on the offensive throughout. Flowers pounded his opponent at will in the early rounds, his rushing tactics completely bewildering his opponent. In the last two rounds Moore made a game rally, but the Tiger repulsed him with stinging rights and lefts to the face which hurt. Flowers seemed unwilling to send Moore down for the count, although several times he had him at his mercy.

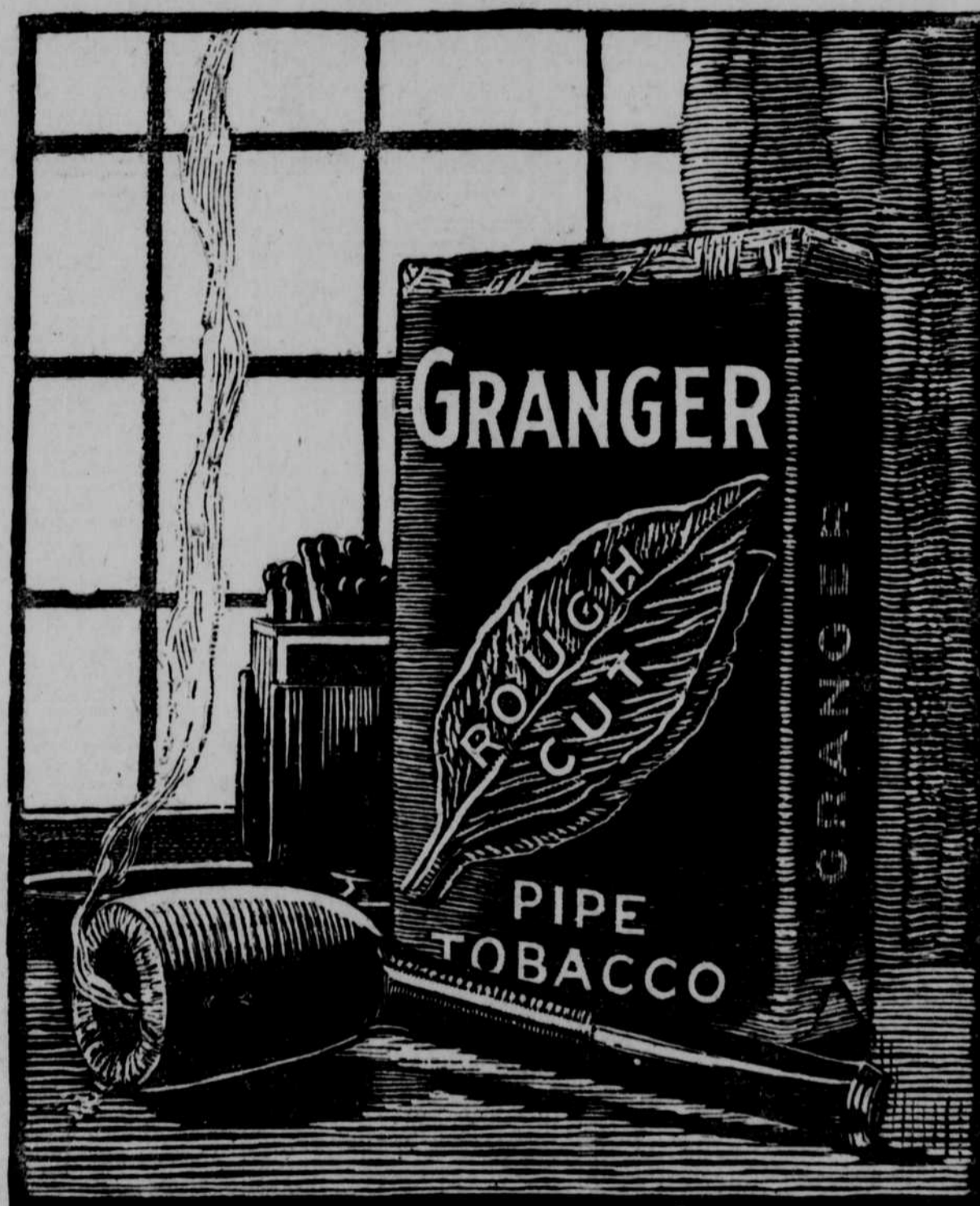
Hines Defeat Whealey.
