

Yeast King Dies During Polo Game

Julius Fleischmann Jumps Off Pony at Miami Field and Falls Dead; Was Noted Sportsman.

Founder of "Bread Line"

Miami, Fla., Feb. 5.—Julius Fleischmann, yeast millionaire philanthropist, and sportsman dismounted from his pony and fell forward on his face, dying at the Nautilus Polo field at Miami Beach this afternoon.

Mayor of Cincinnati. Fleischmann was one of the best known men in America in the field of manufacture, finance and sports.

Born in 1872. Cincinnati, O., Feb. 5.—At the time of his death Julius Fleischmann was president of the Fleischmann company.

Moved to New York. He was forced to remove to New York to take care of his affairs and during the last years he had not spent much of his time in Cincinnati.
