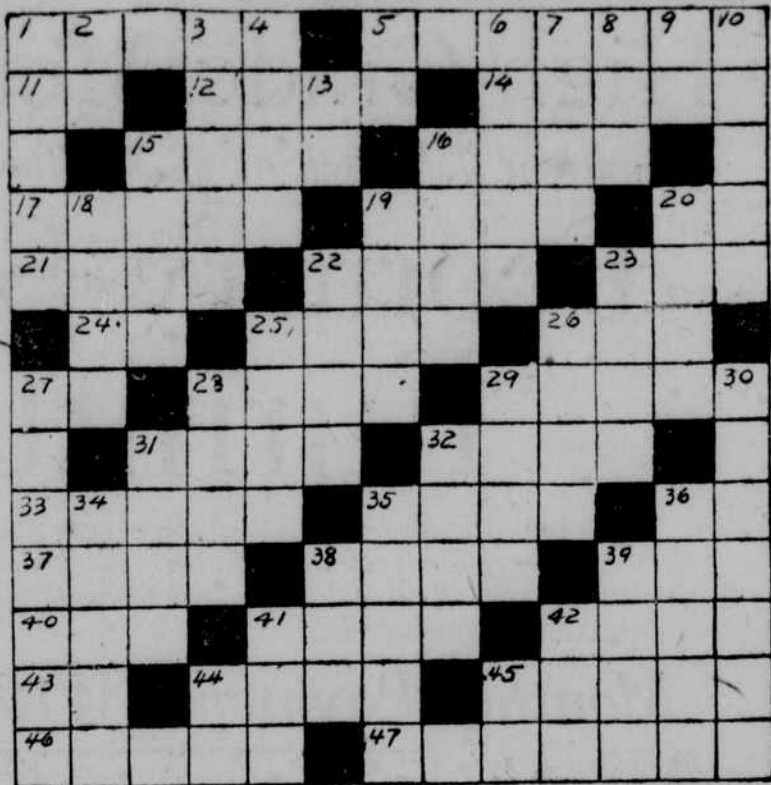
A scientist did say that to a distinguished American clergyman once, and invited the clergyman to go to a museum and count the ribs on many skeletons. The clergyman replied:

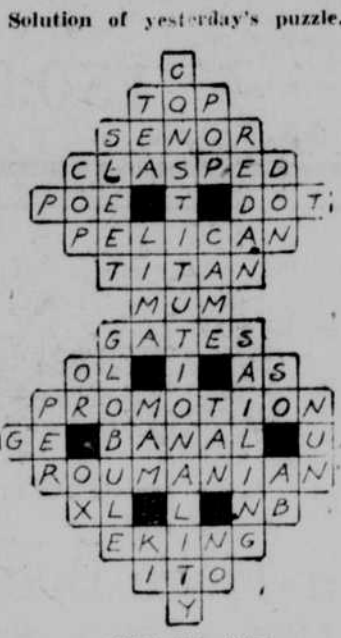

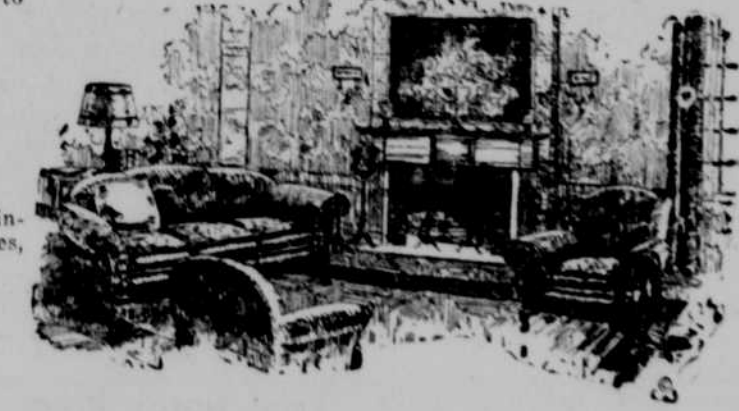
