Wisconsin Five Will Enter Fray With Sub Lineup

Second Stringers Credited With 19 to 17 Victory Over John Carroll University Last Thursday.

HE Creighton university Bluejays, with their third North Central conference basketball championship hanging from their respective belts, and with 13 consecutive wins this season behind them, are primed and loaded for their clash with Marquette at the Hilltop gym Saturday night.

Followers of the Blue and White also remember that the game would be another walkaway for the Bluejays when word was received at Omaha that the five regulars on the Marquette team had been ordered to turn in their suits as punishment for attending the junior prom.

But word which was shot from Milwaukee soon after this news puts the affair in a new light, and an easy victory over Marquette is one thing Coach Schabinger does not anticipate.

For those substitutes of Coach Murray's tore into the John Carroll university last Thursday night to win a 19 to 17 victory over the quintet which had previously crushed the Marquette regulars under a 36 to 16 count.

Anyway, fight is what puts the finger and snap into a cage contest, and these Marquette second stringers have an abundance of this commodity, so a pleasant night is promised the Creightonites.

FEATHERWEIGHTS TO FIGHT TONIGHT

Cards Anticipate Victory in Game With York College Quintet Tonight

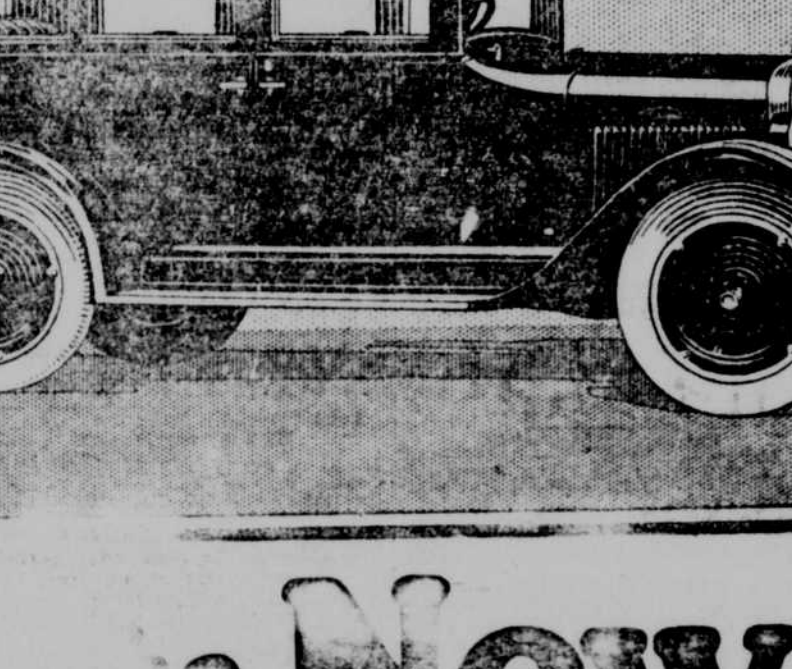
