Doctor Declares McClintock's Guardian Sought Information About Typhoid Germs.

Judge in Fist Fight Senate Rejects

Chicago, Feb. 20.-Testimony that William D. Shepherd, foster father of William Nelson McClintock, the "mil llonaire orphan" had inquired about evidences that might be found in post mortem examination of typhoid germs and of two poisons enlivened the inquest over McClintock's death today. McClintock died last December leaving the bulk of his estate to Shepherd, who was his foster father.

Shepherd, who was in the court room, nervously rubbed his hands while Dr. G. Fosberg told the story of Shepherd's alleged questions con rning typhold bacteria and poison After the inquest had been adjourn ed until next Wednesday, Shepherd's attorney said that their client had never heard of the doctor.

13 flourishing productions. The committee, which will meet District Attorney Banton tomorrow, is headed by John Emerson, president of the Actors Equity associa tion: Owen Davis, playwright, and Rev. Charles K. Gilbert, president of the Protestant Episcopal Social

The "play jury" plan has been moribund two years, despite its having received public endorsement when first presented. As now revived, to hold off the ogre of state censorship, at present glowering down on Broadway, the "jury" would be chosen from panels of 400 selected citizens. An initial panel, made up today from 5,000 names taken from the social register, metropolitan opera box holders, the stock exchange and similar organizations, will be placed before Mr.

"Teeth" to Plan. The "jurors," each of whom would serve upon but one play, ac. cording to the plan, would make but two decisions, namely, whether a suspected play should be taken off the boards at once or could be rewritten to delete offensive scenes or lines. The Actors Equity promised to supply the "teeth" to the first decision by withdrawing its players immediately. For revision the producer would be given one
